EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The cake is frosted, the guests have arrived, and the gifts are piled high. One by one, the packages are opened, and one by one, the child reaches for another. Who among us hasn't seen a child who appears crestfallen when the gifts run out? Even the abundance isn't quite enough. Today's Gospel tackles a key question in the spiritual life - grateful or greedy?

"There was a rich man whose land produced a bountiful harvest." We all recognize the need to be practical. Raising a family, there's need to save for all sorts of things beyond normal day-to-day costs, medical bills, family vacations, private school, rainy day funds, retirement. Jesus doesn't critique the rich man for simply having an abundant harvest. It's his mentality. Does the rich man sell off the extra to make the needed repairs to the back fence or to invest in some additional livestock to grow the business? Perhaps donate some of the excess to the poor? No. "You have so many good things stored up for many years, rest, eat, drink, be merry!" The man wants to hoard and indulge with no concern for others.

Jesus doesn't condemn prudent saving or owning necessary items. He calls us to purify our attitudes. "Guard against all greed... one's life does not consist of possessions." We are called to be good stewards. This means being practical. It also means remaining open to God's invitation with our resources. Are we tithing to our parish? Do we give alms to the poor? Does our weekly entertainment far outstrip what we offer to others? Life is not about "storing up treasure for ourselves". The more we grow in gratitude and generosity, the more we become "rich in what matters to God."

IN OUR PARISH Discover the Catholic Church

Are you interested in learning more about the Catholic faith and becoming Catholic? Have you been baptized in another Christian tradition and now want to join the Catholic Church? Were you baptized Catholic but did not follow up with celebrating the other sacraments, but now wish to enter into full membership in the Church? If so, our RCIA program is for you.

What is RCIA?

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is the process of learning what the Catholic Church believes and teaches, of growing in one's faith and relationship with God, and of discerning what it means to be a member of the Catholic faith community.

Who typically attends RCIA?

- ~ Those who have never been baptized are interested in the Catholic faith.
- Baptized Christians who are interested in learning about the Catholic faith and joining the Catholic Church.
- ~ Those who were baptized Catholic but not fully catechized and not having received Holy Communion and Confirmation.
- Non-Catholics married to Catholics and wanting to more fully understand the Catholic faith.

What are the expectations of the program?

- ~ Weekly participation in a group or individually depending on your prior faith formation.
- Weekly participation at Sunday Mass and reflecting on the Sunday scriptures.
- ~ Spending time with God in prayer and being open to the call of God in your life.

When are RCIA sessions held?

Our RCIA groups for the fall are now forming. Sessions will begin on **Tuesday, September 17th** and continue until the end of April. Classes for adults (ages fourteen and up) will meet on Tuesday evenings from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. and classes for youth (ages 8 to 13) will meet on Tuesday afternoons from 3:45 to 5:00 p.m.

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

I would like to use this space today to share a recent document from the **United States Council of Catholic Bishops** on the immigration issues taking place at the southern border of our country. The recent photo of the father and baby daughter who drowned crossing the Rio Grande inspired **Cardinal Daniel N. DiNardo**, President of the United States Council of Catholic Bishops and **Bishop Joe S. Vasquez** of Austin, Chairperson of the USCCB Committee on Migration to issue this statement entitled:

U.S. Bishops Decry Inhumane Conditions for Children in federal Custody at the Border

We join with our Holy Father, Pope Francis I in immense sadness, having seen horrific images of Oscar Martinez and his daughter Angie Valeria, who died in the Rio Grande Valley while attempting to flee persecution and enter the United States. This image silences politics. Who can look on this picture and not see the results of the failures of all of us to find a humane and just solution to the immigration crisis? Sadly, this picture shows the daily plight of our brothers and sisters. Not only does their cry reach heaven, it reaches us. And it must now reach our federal government.

All people, regardless of their country or origin or legal status, are made in the image and likeness of God and should be treated with dignity and respect. Recent reports of over-crowded and unsanitary conditions are appalling and unacceptable for any person in United States custody, but particularly for children who are uniquely vulnerable. Such conditions cannot be used as tools of deterrence. We can and we must remain a country that provides refuge for children and families fleeing violence, persecution, and acute poverty.

Congress has a duty to provide additional funding to address the needs of children in federal custody. Their supplemental appropriations bill should increase protections for immigrant children, including heightened standards and oversight for border facilities. It is possible and necessary to care for the safety of immigrant children and the security of our citizens. By putting aside partisan interests, a nation as great as ours is able to do both. You may wish to contact our senators and representatives and encourage them to take action to Oppose Inhumane Detention Conditions for Immigrants and Widespread Enforcement Actions. But most importantly, you can pray to the Holy Spirit that the Spirit may open our hearts and strengthen us to carry out God's work with compassion, devotion, and love.

Moving him in reminded me of when his mother and I were first starting out. We received an old couch from her aunt, some kitchen supplies from my mom, and many other things from friends and relatives so we could begin this new journey in our lives. We didn't have much. But we had one another, and we had love. Looking back, those were great times.

Sometimes, we think material possessions give evidence of a life lived well. Artifacts from our travels, collections that take time to amass and provide clues to our interests, and various pictures and prints that adorn our walls. However, those who have lived lives of hardship and pain have many of the same items. Not only doesn't all our stuff amount to real evidence of what our life has really been like, but it doesn't make our lives better either.

What makes a life well lived will be the love and compassion that we have experienced, primarily with God who loves us so deeply. Due to that love, God gives to us what we need, not always what we want. More stuff will never amount to anything in comparison to what God provides to us. If we reflected on that truth more, perhaps we would spend less time accumulating things and more time simply loving.

On that moving day, I wanted to give my son more material things than was possible. However, what he really needs then, now, and always is my love.

After the recent introduction in the U.S. Congress of the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2019, Bishop Frank Dewane (Venice, FI), Chairman of the U.S. Bishops' Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development, welcomed the legislation as an important step forward in addressing climate change. He states, "this bipartisan bill is a hopeful sign that, more and more, climate change is beginning to be seen as a crucial moral issue; one that concerns all people. If enacted, this proposal is expected to result in significant reductions in greenhouse gas emissions. At a time when the dangerous effects of climate change are becoming increasingly apparent, the need for legislative solutions like this is more urgent than ever."
