SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

Peter was a homeless man who lived in a very remote and rudimentary tent community. He was happy to make his daily trip to McDonald's and always welcomed a gift card or two so that he could buy some coffee and something to eat. A generous advocate worked to secure him an apartment in hopes of moving Peter out of his makeshift housing and into something safer. Peter finally got the grand tour of his new "digs," received his own key, remarked how wonderful the place was, closed the door behind him when they left and never returned. He preferred his tent. No matter how much things changed on the outside, Peter was happy where he was. A poignant lesson was learned that day.

How is your Lent going? By now you ought to have a sense of whether you're really "into it" this year and something transformational is happening. For many, it's only the stuff on the outside that changes for a few weeks and then they return to business as usual. For others, there are some real inner changes happening that are deepening their relationships with God, others, self, and creation. If we are serious about moving to a new place and radiating with the presence of new life and joy, then we have to clear the way to listen for God's call. Then, there is God's request to change things up a bit and order our lives differently. After realizing we have been called and given a mission, we have to trust that this is where we need to be. And then, after all of this hard work we are asked to act. The fruit that is revealed will indicate whether our journey is authentic. The brilliance of conversion will begin to shine on our faces as we contemplate the One to whom we are asked to listen.

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Last year, one of our parishioners forwarded to me the following, entitled, "A Lenten Diet." While there was no mention of the identity of the author of this article. I thought these words to be straight forward as we begin this first full week of the season of Lent.

A LENTEN DIET

Fast from criticism, and feast on praise.
Fast from self-pity, and feast on joy.
Fast from ill-temper, and feast on peace.
Fast from resentment, and feast on contentment.
Fast from jealously, and feast on love.
Fast from pride, and feast on humility.
Fast from selfishness, and feat on service.
Fast from fear, and feast on faith.

These words capture well the underlying purposes of our Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, often times referred to as works of mercy. With the grace and direction of the Holy Spirit, our acceptance of each of these practices helps us to put aside everything that diminishes our status as God's people, and to deepen our life in Christ. In the words of the Ash Wednesday's imposition of ashes, we were encouraged to "turn away from sin and to remain faithful to the Gospel."

Consider the Lenten discipline of fasting. The Church asks, as a minimum, that Catholics fourteen (14) years and older abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent, and those aged 14-59 fast (meaning one full meal and no eating between meals) on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. The reason for this for our spiritual lives is that we fast and abstain from the luxuries and pleasures of our world so that we can recognize our shortcomings, our sins, repent of them, opening ourselves to the power and God's grace through prayer and service to the poor, and live more fully the Christian life into which we all have been baptized.

While a good number of people in America have to take a serious look at our relationship with food, we need to be reminded that fasting and abstinence are not about a "diet" that helps us lose some excess weight so that we can be slimmer by Easter. It is not about a fasting from something, but rather a fasting for something. Fasting and abstinence are about reducing our selfish pleasures and involvements, and turning to God and others as primary in our lives. A person can fast from food and drink, from surfing the internet, from relentlessly checking e-mail, tweets and Facebook, from shopping, to watching television, or from hundreds of other things that absorb us disproportionally and take us away from others. As the above mentioned article says, we "fast from selfishness, and feast on service."

The Lenten season calls each of us to embrace the disciplines of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Simply stated, prayer draws us deeper into God's vision of things; fasting empties us of our vision of things, and almsgiving turns us out of ourselves to the
