

EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"You cannot see the forest for the trees" is a widely known saying that can bring wisdom to our understanding of our journey. Often, our sight becomes limited to what is immediately before us. We lose touch with lessons and experiences from the past and promises and hope for the future. As human beings, we have the privilege of being able to choose things. What I like and don't like, want, and don't want can be major preoccupations of our minds and hearts. Our preferences and desires begin to define us more than the simple fact of our being. Who we are matters more than what we are or what we have. If we don't move beyond the external and superficial stuff to what really is of essence, we risk becoming very unsettled, disorientated, angry, and unhappy. We fail to see the bigger picture of hope and promise that lies ahead and the Divine Presence that has sustained and carried us before.

We like it when the "now" time of our lives satisfy us. Even the people who witnessed Jesus feed the five thousand got confused and distracted. It felt good when thousands of people were able to eat. They wanted to know what they could do to get this to happen again! But Jesus quickly reminds them that this is not the point of this sign. As much as the now time of our lives is of concern, it is not what is ultimately important. We need to learn the difference between being and doing, drawing more strength from who we are and who God is rather than what is happening around us and the choices we can make. Jesus is the true bread that came down from heaven. Jesus is the very incarnate presence of God who sustains life and assures us that we will not perish. This is not easy to understand and feel. We have to practice being in the presence of ourselves, others, creation, and God. We are brought to a holy place when we encounter the sacredness of being. This is real prayer.

Then, we learn to trust. It is when we cease trusting that we start to become afraid, uncertain, apprehensive, and doubtful, and overly self-concerned. We even start to grumble. God has our back. That is the essential powerful message of the living bread come down from heaven. God, who is alpha is also omega, the beginning and the end, and has everything in between in his care as well. A woman once remarked that her most powerful God moment happened when she and her husband cuddled with their new baby for a time. Without exchanging words and using only the affection communicated through sight and touch, they rested in being with each other. This brought them to the sacred, where they realized that a greater Being was with them. It was real. They knew that they were part of something bigger, intimate, and profound. When we rest in the Living Source of life, we will find that our souls are no longer hungry or thirsty. ©LPi

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

It's hard to believe that the month of August is upon us! I hope these weeks of summer have afforded you some opportunities for some refreshment and renewal, even as we continue to emerge from the covid-19 pandemic.

Many of you know that I am an avid fan of the Los Angeles Dodgers. I have had the great opportunity to come to know many in the Dodger organization since the summer of 1975, when I served an internship in the Clinical Pastoral Education program at St. Joseph Hospital and Medical Center and Children's Hospital of Orange County, located in Orange, California. I have had the great privilege of coming to know many of the Dodger players, managers, coaches, broadcasters, owners, and front office personnel during these years. The Dodger organization has always been known as a first class organization, one that other professional sports franchises could model their organizations after. The Dodgers were the first team in Major League Baseball to break the color barrier when they signed Jackie Robinson in 1947. The Dodgers were responsible for the expansion of Major League Baseball to the west coast when they moved to Los Angeles in 1958.

There is a book written by James Penrice entitled, "Crossing Home: The Spiritual Lessons of Baseball." If you follow baseball 'religiously' you might enjoy this book. The author believes that the game is a treasure source of Christian symbolism and allegory, providing a wealth of images from which spiritual wisdom can be drawn.

As a Catholic, the superficial similarities between baseball and my faith are strikingly apparent...

We both worship in a variety of temples, from ancient cathedrals revered as cultural landmarks to more modern sanctuaries of contemporary splendor. We canonize our heroes of our past, and adorn our temples with icons of their memory. We print their images on cards and cherish them as sacred objects...

Like church, baseball adheres to a liturgical calendar, annually renewing the cycle of life. We begin with the advent of spring training, where we joyfully anticipate the nativity of opening day (this is an obligation in many towns. For some, it is the only day of the year they attend services)...

Four months into the liturgical year many practice a time of penance, as their heroes tragically succumb at the end of a hard fought campaign. This is immediately followed by the new life of the postseason and the ascension of new champions to the throne...

Baseball has its sacred scriptures. Psalms include such verses as "Casey at the Bat" and "Take Me Out to the Ballgame"...
