

CREATING A SAFE ENVIRONMENT (CASE) MANDATORY TRAINING FOR PARISH VOLUNTEERS

In March 2021, the Diocese of Rochester updated its *Volunteer Creating a Safe Environment (CASE) Policy* to include ALL volunteers, not just those who work with children or vulnerable adults. The training is offered in an easy to use online program. Volunteers will be required to sign a Code of Conduct and complete a background check prior to starting your volunteer service.

This mandatory CASE training must be renewed every three years (volunteers over 70 years of age who have previously completed CASE training are only required to complete the background check and Code of Conduct forms).

With the new policy, all ushers, cantors, lectors, Eucharistic ministers, Faith Formation and youth group volunteers are required to be CASE trained.

Since this training is mandatory, if a person is not able to complete it, unfortunately, they can no longer volunteer.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

EVERY DAY STEWARDSHIP

If you're a parent, you know that hearing evaluations are usually done at a child's annual physical exam starting around age four. The little person gets hoisted up onto the exam table, fitted with a pair of special headphones, and then they need raise their hand when they hear a sound.

I bet all of us parents who have sat through one of these tests with a preschooler — especially a particularly strong-willed one — have experienced a moment where we ask ourselves: I wonder if there's something wrong with her hearing. Is that why she doesn't listen to me? 'Come here, put on your shoes, pick up your toys, finish your carrots, don't touch that' — she isn't being naughty, she just can't hear it!

And then that moment, for those of us whose kids passed the hearing test with flying colors, comes crashing down into a realization that, yep, they can hear just find. They're just choosing deafness.

But how can we really get mad when we remember that we do the same thing to God day in and day out? I often wonder if God, sitting in His Heaven, tires of calling to us in the same way young parents tire of calling out unheeded directions to their small children. Help that person. Hear My voice. Open your heart. Give of yourself here. Talk to Me.

What is the call He wishes you to hear today? Can you hear it? Are you listening?

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Another Labor Day weekend is upon us! This weekend signals for many the end of summer activities. With schools opening this week, summer vacations are winding down, and with autumn just around the corner, it is time to savor the Labor Day weekend. Many families and groups of friends will gather this weekend to enjoy this final holiday of the summer season. With this in mind, it is important to pause and appreciate the meaning of this holiday.

The question has been often asked, "When did

The question has been often asked, "When did Labor Day become a holiday?" In 1894, President Grover Cleveland declared Labor Day a legal holiday a time for people of this nation to pay tribute to the American worker. Three years earlier, Pope Leo XIII had published a landmark encyclical entitled Rerum Novarum, which championed the rights and dignities of workers. Leo XIII insisted that all workers had the right to productive work, just wages, and benefits. To achieve these goals, workers also have the right to organize or to join a union.

On this Labor Day, Americans have much to be grateful for. Even in these challenging economic times, we enjoy economic freedom. The prosperity we enjoy in this country is not something that is common in every country throughout the world. Many people have been left behind and the gap in family income continues to widen. The top five percent of the American population takes home a larger share in personal income than they did forty years ago. At the same time, the shares of income going to people in the middle sixty percent has declined by nearly ten percent. This decline is even sharper for those in the bottom twenty percent. This trend is one reason for America to respect a strong, active, and democratic labor movement.

Workers, particularly members of organized labor, have given much to America over the last century. It is through their efforts that the great American middle-class was born. Yet American unions never capitalized to the concept of "class" warfare that found such fertile ground in the rest of the industrialized world. Union leaders instead saw their organization as part of the American experience of democracy and urged their membership to seek social justice for all instead of class struggle.

Many of the values embedded in the labor movement's search for social justice have a firm foundation in our own faith values. Both seek public policies that protect and promote strong families and family values, expand a stable middle-class, create decent jobs, and reduce the level of poverty and need in our society. In another encyclical on labor and the dignity of work. *Laborum Exercens* the late **Pope John Paul II** envisioned a society in which the singular title of "worker" would be applied to all, whether the worker be a doctor, a mechanic, or a CEO. Work, the late Holy Father wrote, "is something we do, it stands at the core of our persona identity." These are simply a few thoughts for us to ponder this Labor Day.

Sacramental Preparation

We are currently accepting registrations for the Sacraments of First Reconciliation/First Eucharist and Confirmation.

If your child is at least 7 years old, in second grade and has completed at least one year of faith formation and will be registering for religious education classes this year, your child will be eligible to prepare and celebrate the Sacraments of First Penance and First Holy Communion.

If you have a teen, entering the 8th grade or above, who has been in a continuous faith formation program through 7th grade, and has a desire to complete their initiation into the Catholic Church, your teen is eligible to begin the preparation process for their Confirmation.

Faith Formation Opportunities for 2021/2022 School Year

As of today's date, we are planning to bring back our Tuesday afternoon on-site K-6th grade program. We are also planning to resume our Home Study program for families who wish to do the study at home with their children. If neither of these options work for your family, we will also offer the Google Classroom forum. Seventh grade religious education will have a choice to participate in the online Google Classroom format or Home Study.

On-going Religious Education classes, through 7th grade, are most appropriate and extremely helpful for a student to be successful in Confirmation preparation. Students become eligible to begin preparation in the fall of their 8th grade school year. If you have a student entering 8th grade in September who wishes to prepare and celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation, please contact the Faith Formation office to request a registration form.
