15TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:

He summoned the Twelve and began to send them out two by two." This Sunday we read the first sending of the Apostles to preach, teach, and heal. For many of us, it can be easy to think we "just don't have enough" to be disciples and evangelists ourselves. We don't have enough education and training. We don't have enough experience talking to people about Jesus. We don't pray enough. We don't have enough faith. If we look at the Apostles in today's Gospel reading, they didn't have much either. "No food, no sack, no money in their belts." They didn't plan out their itinerary or book their lodging in advance. From what we know of the Apostles, they were not the religiously trained and educated ones. They were fisherman, tax collectors, and political activists. But what does being a fisherman require? Someone like Peter needed a strong work ethic to rise at strange hours. He needed patient calm to wait for the catch. Once ashore, he needed a savvy mind to fetch a good price for his labors.

As Peter became a fisher of men, he would need diligence to persevere though the hard journeys, long days, and persecution that awaited him. He would need patient calm with those who disagreed with him. As the leader of the Apostles, he would need a savvy mind to navigate challenges facing the early Church. From one perspective, Peter has nothing to offer the mission of Jesus. Thinking more creatively, one can see that--joined with faith and love--perhaps Peter has everything he needed.

Jesus sends you as well. As you take stock of your own talents, consider how they might be offered as a gift to others. Maybe you already have more than enough.

The month of July is swimming, picnicking, the lake or the beach, and vacation. July brings Fourth of July parades and highways and airports jammed with travelers. The July issue of the **International Council on Stewardship** offers the following random ideas for the month of July.

- 1. Invite a single friend over for a meal.
- 2. Turn off your digital world for one hour, and spend that hour devoted to someone you love.
- 3. Attend an extra Mass on a weekday during this month.
- 4. Abstain from something you like--meat, a latte, a cold drink on Fridays and save the money for a charity.
- 5. Take your rosary with you on your early morning walk.
- 6. Recycle more.
- 7. Think of a charity which is amply blessed at Christmas, and remember it with a mid-year gift.
- 8.

 Each day, say a prayer for those who suffer in one of the world's troubled spots.
- 9. Surprise an old friend with a telephone call.
- 10. Buy or pick a flower for someone without a "reason".
- 11. Take the family to a farmer's market if in season.
- 12. Stop for a moment during your busy day, relax and reflect on God's gifts to you that day.
- 13. If you hear a good homily, presentation, or talk, tell the speaker.
- 14. Splurge on some produce and buy enough to share with someone in need.
- 15. On occasion, try turning the memorized recitation of prayer before meals into a spontaneous prayer of thanks, using your own words.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEP-ER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Once I asked a fallen-away Catholic friend of mine what he remembered about the parish priest from his youth. He said, "He was a gentle, nice guy, kind of vanilla, kept to himself." It struck me that he, perhaps like many, perceived Catholic priests as the following: lonely, harmless, and self-sufficient. As a challenge to this perception (accurate or not) and to us priests who perhaps feel a pull in that uninspiring direction, stands the mighty image of what we see in the Gospel this Sunday.

Jesus sent out His apostles, "two-by-two, with power over demons, and without money belts." Two-by-two: they enjoyed deep fellowship and brotherhood. Power over demons: they were anything but harmless. These men wielded enormous power against evil. Without money belts: they were not self-sufficient. They needed others to help them. Not lonely, but in community. Not harmless but armed with massive spiritual energy. Not self-sufficient, but poor and in need of help.

This is a challenge to me, and perhaps to all of us, living in a rich, secularized, and individualized culture. Do I embrace my priestly ministry in deep fellowship with other priests? Do I speak and act boldly to drive out evil where it is found? Do I live poorly and simply, trusting in the help of those around me even for basic needs? The fruitfulness of priestly ministry largely depends on these three traits. Let's pray for all priests — and, by extension, all of us Christians — to live more like Jesus' communal, poor, and powerful apostles.

SAINT BONAVENTURE:

Saint Bonaventure was a famous Franciscan friar. He lived in the 13th century. He was born in Italy in 1221. His birth name was Giovanni di Fidanza.

As a young man, Bonaventure became very ill. His mother prayed to Saint Francis of Assisi for help. Bonaventure got better and decided to join the Franciscan Order. He studied in Paris and became a great teacher. Bonaventure was known for his wisdom and love for God. He wrote many books about the faith. He also helped lead the Franciscan Order. People called him the "Seraphic Doctor" because of his deep love and understanding. Seraphic means good and pure, like an angel.

. Bonaventure was a man of prayer known for his embrace of simplicity and poverty. When he was made a cardinal in 1273 he refused to wear the traditional red hat of a cardinal. Instead he left it hanging on a bush! As a child he was called John.

He was canonized on April 14th, 1482 by Pope Sixtus IV and declared a Doctor of the Church in 1588 by Pope Sixtus V. His feast day is July 15th. Many writings believed in the Middle Ages to be his are now collected under the name Pseudo-Bonaventure.
