PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

Another Labor Day holiday is upon us! For many, this weekend signals the end of summer activities. With schools opening this week, many summer vacations are winding down, and after a very warm, humid, and rainy summer, it is time to savor the Labor Day holiday weekend. Many families and groups of friends have a Labor Day gathering as a signal that another summer season is coming to an end. With this in mind, it is important for us to stop and appreciate the meaning of this civil holiday.

Of all the national holidays we have, Labor Day doesn't seem to get much attention. One reason might be is that we haven't found a way to commercialize the holiday as we have with Christmas, Valentine's Day, Easter, Mother's Day, Thanksgiving and the like. Another reason is that the original intent of this day has pretty much vanished since labor unions have become a part of the American business environment. It is important to remember that the unions were the early voice of the ordinary worker, advocating for the dignity and rights of the worker.

The efforts of labor unions to protect the well-being of "voiceless workers" have resulted in the passage of legislation which now protect the rights and safety of many workers. However, there are still many people both near and far who fall into the category of the "voiceless worker." I am referring to the seasonal workers who are helping with the harvesting of our crops in our upstate New York area. These workers play an important role in our local economy. There is also the talented, young African-American who cannot find work because prejudice stands in the way. There are the textile workers of the world who help make the clothes you and I wear, and the farm workers who play an important role to help us enjoy the morning cup of coffee or tea whose wages are so unjust they are hardly able to provide basic necessities of life for themselves and their families. There are those who are part of the work force throughout the world, including children, who perform their duties in extremely unsafe conditions. Who is "there for them" when it comes to just wages, a safe working environment, and basic human dignity?

On this Labor Day, please take a few moments to reflect on the work of others which supports the life you have become accustomed. Pause to give thanks to God for this huge network of people, from the farm and plantation workers who provide food for our tables; for the clothing workers from around the world who make the clothes we wear; for health care professionals whose efforts keep us in good health and those whose on-going research helps to provide cures for the diseases and illnesses that plague us; for police, fire-fighters, emergency medical personnel, and first responders who watch and protect our community; 'behind-the-scenes' people who support our use and everincreasing dependency on technology and electronic devices; to artists, writers, and musicians who help enhance the beauty that surrounds us; to actors, directors, producers, the professional and amateur athlete who guarantee that we are entertained; the people of our postal system, those who maintain our buildings, streets, arenas, and stadiums; the ministers of our churches. The list is endless!

The Word

On November 28, 1981, Alphonsine Mumureke was in the dining room at her high school in Kibeho, a small village in southwestern Rwanda. She heard a voice. It was a woman, veiled and beautiful. Alphonsine asked her who she was. "I am the Mother of the Word," answered the woman.

It was the first appearance of Our Lady of Kibeho, who would return to visit Alphonsine and two of her schoolmates over the course of the next eight years. She left with them an urgent call for repentance, along with a prophecy of the Rwandan genocide that would come to fruition in the next decade.

I have always found it compelling that Our Lady chose to identify herself in this way at Kibeho. *The Mother of the Word*. A title so simple and so concise, but so heavy with meaning.

"In the beginning was the Word..." says the Gospel of John in its opening lines.

But what is the Word? Is it spoken, or is it felt? Is it seen, written, heard? Is it shouted or whispered? Is it scribbled across pages that will one day dry and disappear? Is it carved into stone tablets, or on the nameplate above a cross? Is it poured over our foreheads? Is it set ablaze in a bush? Is it etched into our hearts?

It is all of these things, yes, but it is more, still. The Word is not something that is merely spoken. It is not merely written. The Word is something that is done. It is something that we must choose to do.

Our Lady of Kibeho lamented that this world "has neither love nor peace." "If you do not convert and heal your hearts, you will all fall into an abyss," she warned.

But how do we convert our hearts? What snatches us back from the brink?

It is the Word, spoken. It is the Word, carried out. Not just one, and not just the other, but both.

"Humbly welcome the word that has been planted in you and is able to save your souls." — James 1:21

The beginning of the school year is fast approaching, and that means the start of our parish faith formation classes. Following you will find important dates of when each program will begin.

CONFIRMATION YRS. 1 & 2: Sunday, September 29, 2024. There will be a meeting beginning at 5:00 p.m. in the church. All incoming 8th graders (year 1) and 9th graders (year 2) must attend with a parent. If your child will be entering 9th grade or above, has received the Sacraments of Baptism and First Holy Communion, and has not started year 2 Confirmation classes, they are encouraged to attend this meeting as well.

First Penance: Saturday, September 21, 2024, there will be a meeting at 9:00 a.m. in the church. All incoming 2nd graders who plan on receiving First Holy Communion in the Spring must attend this meeting with a parent. If your child is in a grade level other than 2nd grade and is at least seven years old and has been baptized and would like to receive First Holy Communion in the Spring must attend this meeting for First Penance.

Tuesday Faith Formation Program: Our Tuesday program will begin on Tuesday, September 24, 2024 beginning at 3:45 p.m. in the church. Please drop your student off in the church. Pick-up will also be in the church at 5:00 p.m.

Youth Group: The first Youth Group meeting of the school year will be held on Sunday, October 6, at 5:00 p.m. All students in grades 6 and above are encouraged to come and bring a friend.

Home Study: Saturday, October 5, 2024, there will be a home study meeting in O'Brien Hall following the 5:00 p.m. Mass.

Give it all Back

Pop culture has given us a unique idea of the term justice. Justice, we often think, is about taking. Taking what's owed. Taking revenge. Taking what we deserve. This worldview tends to make mincemeat of our Catholic social teachings. Seeking the good of the poor, a call to community and participation, solidarity — on the face of it, in a society where everything must be earned and we are encouraged to hoard for ourselves whatever success we can achieve, these principles look a lot like highway robbery.

But when you remember the presence of an omnipotent, all-loving and all-merciful God, it turns our gunslinging sense of justice on its head. For how does justice inhabit the same universe as a God who is so quick to give and indeed to forgive?

Well, very easily, when we remember Who exactly is the source of every good and perfect thing in this world. There is no law that cannot be traced back to the Word. And the Word saves our souls.

Is that justice? No, that is a gift. It is the reckless, indulgent gift of a father whose love is greater than His anger. What is justice in the Biblical sense?

The answer is simple. Look at your life. See the hours in your day? See your spouse, your kids, your grandkids? See the house they live in, the money in your wallet, the food in your fridge, the breath in your lungs?

Calling it all your own, refusing to share any of it — that's robbery. Giving it all back to the One who gave it to you — that's justice.
