

We welcome those who are grieving the death of a loved one to this sharing; as you are each hoping o find encouragement, insight, and normalization from each other. You may share or you may just listen. We encourage you to be sensitive to your own needs. ALL are welcome.

#### **PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:**

Wednesday of this week is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the season of Lent. This season is a sacred time for all Christians, leading to the celebration of Easter. For those preparing to celebrate the sacraments of Christian initiation at Easter as well as those preparing to be receive into full communion in the Church, Lent is a time of prayer and preparation for those sacraments. For those who regularly participate in the life of the Church, the season of Lent offers us an opportunity to embrace the Lenten disciples of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, so that we can recommit ourselves to living fully our baptismal promises which we will renew on Easter Sunday. For those who have been away from the Church for whatever reason, Lent is a time to reconsider renewing that relationship once again. Most of us know someone who is in this category, so please offer a word of encouragement, invitation, and welcome to our parish. A great deal has been written about the "New Evangelization" that is needed in today's church. The process of Evangelization begins with a word of encouragement and welcome. Wherever you find yourself in your faith journey, please use Lent 2025 as a time of spiritual growth and renewal.

Today's bulletin provides information on Lenten opportunities available to you at St. Mary Our Mother, as well as a Lenten calendar for your use at home.

For the past years, we have offered publications for your spiritual growth through the Lenten season. Two of these you are familiar with. The first is **"The Word Among Us,"** which offers a complete liturgical guide for the Lenten season, including scripture readings, Mass texts, and meditations. The second publication is **"The Little Black Book for Lent,"** which offers unique readings, meditations, and reflections for each day of Lent. There is also a children's version of this book entitled **"The Little Purple Book for Lent,"** which will be distributed to our children in both our school and faith formation programs. These book will be available on the table in the vestibule.

A traditional devotion in the Church during the Lenten season is the public praying of the **Stations of the Cross**. We will publicly pray the Stations each Friday at 5:15 p.m. in the chapel. I invite you and your family to join us for this Lenten devotion. We also have a long standing practice of the sixth grade students from St. Mary Our Mother School taking the leadership roles in offering a rendition of the "Living Stations of the **Cross.**" The Living Stations will be offered on Wednesday, April 9th. At 1:15 and 5:15 p.m. in the church. The Living Stations will replace the Stations on Friday for that week only.

#### HAPPY 50TH ANNIVERSARY CRS RICE BOWL:

Back in 1975, Rice Bowl started in Allentown, PA as an ecumenical response to world hunger driven by the drought in Africa. Just two years later, Rice Bowl was voted in by the US Catholic bishops as the official global assistance program of the Catholic Church. Today CRS Rice Bowl programs are working to alleviate hunger in over 120 countries.

Rice Bowl funds support programs that include agricultural assistance, water and sanitation projects, microfinancing of small businesses, mother/child health and nutrition programs, and education initiatives. Over 90% of the Rice Bowl funds go directly to these programs. Rice Bowl has raised over \$380 million dollars in these fifty years to help millions of people the world over.

St. Mary Our Mother Parish and School have adopted CRS Rice Bowl as our Lenten almsgiving project. We invite all our parishioners to consider this project for their Lenten sacrifices. Rice bowls will be available in the vestibule of the church starting on Ash Wednesday, March 5th.

# **EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP**

March 3, 2019 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time

I was traveling recently and watched as a wife led her blind husband onto the plane by her arm. She lovingly helped him into his seat and made sure he was comfortable. She placed their bags above in the bin and then sat next to him. They were ready for the flight. As I sat in my seat just a few rows away, I wondered what he would do if she ever left his side.

Sometimes those we love in our life can be blind, and we need to be their eyes. They aren't physically blind, but they are unable to see the truth about their life, situation, or needs. We need to lend them our sight and insight, or they will remain in their world of darkness.

Jesus asked his disciples, "Can a blind person guide a blind person?" If we aren't actively working to be sure that we can see clearly, what will we be able to offer someone we care about when they come to us with their blindness? Can you lead someone to Christ if you aren't living a life with him yourself? Can you share with another truth if you aren't concerned with knowing the truth yourself?

Life is not always easy. Without faith, hope, and love, the road can be too hard to travel. We are not created to be alone. Instead, we are created to be traveling companions. However, the blind cannot lead the blind. May the Light of Christ dispel your darkness and give you sight so that when the call comes, you might lend an arm to lead the blind.



# **GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE**

Luke 6:39-45

One of the things that older pastors and younger priests occasionally quarrel about is the proper balance between work and prayer. I know one pastor who complains that his younger associate ignores the people and the parish because he wants to spend more time in prayer. And the young priest complains that the pastor gives him too much work to do and no time to pray. The Lord's words this Sunday speak into this tension with an image that can help us find a proper balance between life and prayer.

Jesus says, "For every tree is known by its fruit. For people do not pick figs from thorn bushes, nor do they gather grapes from brambles" (Luke 6:44). When we are deeply rooted and cultivating our relationship with Jesus, we are going to bear the fruit of that love in our lives. No fruit, no good prayer. How do we know that we are praying well? We are experiencing concrete fruits of love for others in our lives.

Someone who prays well will, sooner or later, burst forth the "figs" and "grapes" of acts of love. But without concrete commitment to deeds of selfless service to others, our prayer time is as useless as thorn bushes and brambles. Let's recommit ourselves to be men and women of prayer and service. And hopefully the pastors will help their associates to pray and serve fruitfully...with minimal quarreling.
