



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

Where do you live? I live in North Carolina. There I pay taxes, own a home, and belong to a parish. North Carolina is in the United States, so I also abide by federal laws, pay taxes, and vote for candidates in all sorts of elections. I identify as an American and try my best to meet certain expectations placed on me by the government, state, and fellow Americans. I do certain things because of my identity.

St. Paul wrote to the Philippians, "Our citizenship is in heaven." Being a U.S. citizen living in North Carolina places certain requirements on me. How many of us "citizens of heaven" take seriously the expectation and requirements of that citizenship? Sometimes we act like nothing is truly required of us.

Stewardship as a way of life requires us to take seriously what it means to be a citizen of heaven. We are called to follow the laws of the land we live in on this earth, but we are called to adhere to an even greater authority. Whether it be our call to act with charity and love or to follow the precepts of the church, we must take seriously our status as citizen.

Unfortunately, many don't take seriously their citizenship on this earth either. People have given their very lives so that we may have the freedom to be citizens of our country and our state. Of course, many people have died for the citizenship of heaven as well. So it comes down to the question, who are you and to whom do you belong?

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

In recent years, one of the monthly themes that has been observed during the month of March is that of Women's History Awareness Month. This is an annual observance to highlight the contributions of women in history and contemporary society. That theme caused me to remember the women of the United States whom the Church has declared saints. Do you know who was the first to be canonized a saint? There are eight women who are canonized, who were citizens of the United States, or who worked in our country. These are listed as they appear on the calendar.

- January 4—Elizabeth Ann Bayley Seton (1774-1821) A wife, mother of five, founder of the Sisters of Charity in the United States, who laid the foundation for the Catholic school system, opened orphanages, and cared for the poor. She is the first US born saint.
- January 23—**Marianne Cope** (1838-1918) a Sister of St. Francis of Syracuse, New York, who helped found St. Joseph Hospital, and for 35 years cared for the lepers on Moloka Island.
- March 3—Katherine Drexel (1858-1918) a Philadelphia heiress who founded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament dedicated to the education of Black and Native American children, and established Xavier University in New Orleans; a powerful advocate for justice for the poor and oppressed.
- July 14—Kateri Tekekwitha (1656-1680) A native American who was orphaned at age 4, disabled by small pox, baptized at 20. She was mocked and persecuted for her disabilities and her Christian faith among her own people. She lived an exemplary life of prayer and holiness with perseverance and charity.
- October 3—**Theodora Guerin** (1798-1856): Theodora came from France at the request of the Bishop of Vincennes, Indiana, and founded the Sisters of Providence of St. Mary of the Woods. She established schools, orphanages, and even a pharmacy. She resisted repeatedly the Bishop's attempts to control the rules and ministry of her Order, eventually locking her in her room and excommunicating her. All was resolved when Rome asked for and received the bishop's resignation.
- October 6—Marie Rose Durocher (1811-1849) She came to this country from Canada and founded the American branch of Sisters of the Holy Name of Jesus and Mary, and was an educator of poor and orphaned children, especially girls.

Pastor's Perspective continued:

- November 13—**Frances Xavier Cabrini** (1850-1917): She came to America to minister to Italian immigrants, and founded 67 schools and other charities in New York, Chicago, and South America. She was the first citizen of this country to be canonized.
- November 18 **Rose Philippine Duchesne** (1769-1852) She was born in France, and upon arriving in New Orleans, founded the U.S. Chapter of the Religious of the Sacred Heart, founding schools and orphanages along the Mississippi River for Native American children.

All of these women's lives speak eloquently of how one's faith can bring vitality to our diverse nation.

CATHOLIC REFUGEE MINISTRIES: LETTER OF POPE FRANCIS TO THE U.S. BISHOPS, Feb. 10, 2025

"I am writing today to address a few words to you in these delicate moments that you are living as pastors of the people of God who walk together in the United States of America".

- 1. The journey from slavery to freedom that the People of Israel traveled, as narrated in the Book of Exodus, invites us to look at the reality of our time, so clearly marked by the phenomenon of migration, as a decisive moment in history to reaffirm not only our faith in a God who is always close, incarnate, migrant and refugee, but also the infinite and transcendent dignity of every human person.
- 2. These words with which I begin are not an artificial construct. Even a cursory examination of the Church's social doctrine emphatically shows that Jesus Christ is the true Emmanuel (cf. Mt 1:23); He did not live apart from the difficult experience of being expelled from His own land because of an imminent risk to His life, and from the experience of having to take refuge in a society and a culture foreign to His own. The Son of God, in becoming man, also chose to live the drama of immigration. I like to recall, among other things, the words with which Pope Pius XII began his Apostolic Constitution on the 'Care of Migrants', which is considered the "Magna Carta" of the Church's thinking on migration:

"The family of Nazareth in exile, Jesus, Mary and Joseph, emigrants in Egypt and refugees there to escape the wrath of an ungodly king, are the model, the example and the consolation of emigrants and pilgrims of every age and country, of all refugees of every condition who, beset by persecution or necessity, are forced to leave their homeland, beloved family and dear friends for foreign lands."

3. Likewise, Jesus Christ, loving everyone with a universal love, educates us in the permanent recognition of the dignity of every human being, without exception. In fact, when we speak of "infinite and transcendent dignity," we wish to emphasize that the most decisive value possessed by the human person surpasses and sustains every other juridical consideration that can be made to regulate life in society. Thus, all the Christian faithful and people of good will are called upon to consider the legitimacy of norms and public policies in the light of the dignity of the person and his or her fundamental rights, not vice versa..."
