

PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – BENEATH THE SURFACE

Mini Reflection: What's so special about Pentecost that it wasn't until this moment — and not any of the equally world-changing moments that came in the weeks before it — that the Apostles became the Church?

Leaving the Room

I was a full-grown adult before I realized that Pentecost is known as "the birthday of the Church," and it only resonated with me because someone showed up to a church function with cake and candles. Leave it to buttercream frosting to drive home a theological reality I had been missing for 25 years.

I knew what Pentecost was, of course. It simply went over my head that, despite all the incredible, world-changing things that had come before the moment of Pentecost, prior to this day, the Apostles were just a group of guys in a room. It wasn't until Pentecost that they became the Church.

So what makes the Church...well, the Church, capital C? What makes it more than just a group of guys in a room?

It's true, they were a very special group of guys. They had the Truth — capital. They had borne witness to Christ's miracles, to His life and to His passion and death.

But they were still in that room.

When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they received graces and gifts that made them fit to carry out the Great Commission. The Truth wasn't enough, even with a capital T. They needed the Spirit — capital S — and more than that, they needed to receive it with the courage and faith necessary to do what needed to be done.

To get up and leave the room.

Because what good is any of it unless they leave the room? What does it matter, the tongues of fire and the miraculous bilingualism and, frankly, the coming of the Spirit, if no one ever hears about it?

The mission is what made them the Church. It's what makes us the Church. Without it, we're just a bunch of guys in a room.

RETROUVAILLE **A LIFE LINE FOR MARRIED COUPLES**

Retrouvaille simply means "rediscovery." This program offers the chance to rediscover yourself, your spouse and a loving relationship in your marriage.

Retrouvaille (pronounced retro-vi) is designed to help troubled marriages regain their health. It helps spouses uncover or re-awaken the love, trust and commitment that originally brought them together. Where there are hurts, it can take away the resentment which gets in the way of healing. It can be a helpful supplement to an addiction program though it is not a recovery program in itself. It is Catholic in nature but open to couples of all faiths or backgrounds.

This world-wide program is in 27 countries and has been in Rochester for over 35 years. It has even helped separated or divorced couples who want to try again.

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THE FAMILY ZONE:

Born on September 14, 1955, Robert Francis Prevost, in Chicago, Illinois, Pope Leo XIV is the 267th pope of our Church. He is the first North American Pope. Pope Leo holds dual citizenship between America and the country of Peru, where he served as a missionary and the Bishop of Chiclayo in Peru; he is also the first pope with Peruvian citizenship. Pope Leo entered the Order of St. Augustine in 1977 and made his solemn vows on August 29,1981. He also holds the honor of being the first Augustinian Pope! He was ordained as a priest on June 19, 1982. He also holds the honor of being the first Augustinian Pope! He was ordained as a priest on June 19, 1982. He also served as the head (Prior General) of Augustinian Order, and the head of the office that places new bishops around the world called the Dicastery for Bishops. He holds degrees in Mathematics, Theology and Canon Law. He is multilingual and speaks English, Spanish, Italian, French, and Portuguese. The last Pope Leo (XIII) is known as the father of our modern Catholic Social Teaching and was a champion of the working class. As Pope, he was known to be an advocate for education, science and diplomacy; it is likely that Pope Leo chose his name to honor the work of Pope Leo XIII, and to hope to continue down that path. In Pope Leo XIV's first address to the faithful he said: "We have to be a church that works together to build bridges and to keep our arms open like this very piazza (St. Peter's Square), welcoming." Other themes in his first address included peace unity. We pray for our new Holy Father and the work he will accomplish in God's name.

PRAYER FOR THE NEW POPE LEO XIV

O God, shepherd and ruler of all the faithful, look favorably on your servant Leo, whom you have set at the head of your church as her shepherd; grant, we pray, that by word and example he may be of service to those over whom he presides so that, together with the flock entrusted to his care, he may come to everlasting life. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Ring of the Fisherman:

This ring is part of the official uniform of the pope. Because every pope is a successor to St. Peter, who was a fisherman by trade, this ring symbolizes the Gospel message for the apostles to be "Fishers of Men." (Mark 1:17) In centuries past, the ring was used to seal official correspondence or documents from the pope, but now it is just a symbolize of the end of a papacy and the beginning of a new one.
