#### **PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:**

Due to an early deadline for this bulletin, I am writing this column on Monday, October 6th, in anticipation of the Columbus holiday weekend. We are also anticipating the first update of our support of the annual **Catholic Ministries Appeal.** 

October is the month when we center our attention on the respect for all life, often times referred to as **Respect Life Month.** It is a time of year when we see significant changes in our weather and the summer activities come to an end and autumn activities begin. It is a time when we become aware of the "dying" of the earth as flowers go into their winter slumber, as the trees give up their colorful leaves, as we tend to remain indoor more often, and the cooler days reminds us that winter is not far off.

These seasonal changes invite us to explore human changes. We become aware of the boundaries of life: living, dying, rising again. We become aware of how very precious each day of life is and how we should treasure each day that God gives us. We also become more aware of those who share life with us and how precious is their life to us and the world.

Given this reality, we focus once again on the basic tenets of our faith: life begins with God and life ends according to God's plan. The Church teaches us that life begins at conception. As a mother cares for her infant in the womb, she is assisting God in the creative process not only giving birth to new life, but allowing herself to house life and nurture her developing child. We hear and see many debates these days which speak of life in the womb—what can be allowed and what must be forbidden; what can be legislated and what can not be legislated. We see political debates from those seeking office who attempt to define the church's teaching. The teaching is rather simple—life begins at conception when God chooses to initiate the creation of a new child.

In the same vein, life continues until God determines when we should come home to heaven. This has become somewhat complicated with the advance of medicine and the development of technology and medications which can prolong and sustain life. At times, a family may face the question, "are we sustaining life or simply keeping the body going?" Families have to decide when enough is enough regarding treatments and medications. This is also a challenge because no one likes to let go of a loved one and no one likes to think that they may have ended someone's life. Yet, deciding for comfort care, deciding this is enough pain, deciding that further treatment is not going to add to the quality of life, embracing the idea that it is time to let go and let God bring a loved one homethese are all quality decisions and actually embrace life and the preciousness with which we hold life.

It is more challenging to appreciate life when we are angry with another, when we have been hurt, when we are frightened or confused. We do not value life when we feel sad or depressed, lost and wonder where are friends are, and don't even value our own lives! Yet, the challenge is always to realize that life is precious! Why? Life is a gift from God— and we cannot take that fact lightly. Life is entrusted to us and we need to be responsible for it and never place any life in jeopardy. Life is something to be experienced, enjoyed, and seen as a means of coming in touch with God. Life always evolves, grows, and surprises us—and none of this will happen if we are not open to life.

As we continue our journey during this month of October, **Respect Life Month**, take a moment to appreciate the wonderful and unique life God has given just to you.

## PRACTICING CATHOLIC – BENEATH THE SURFACE

Mini reflection: In the same way that a judge cannot go looking for conflicts to mediate, God will not force His way into our problems. What would be the point? What is our life on earth for, if it is not to teach us how to turn willingly to God?

#### The Prayers We Don't Say

It has always confused me: why a judge?

Jesus could have compared prayer to the subject who requests a gift of his king. He could have compared it to the child who asks a favor of a parent. But in the parable of the widow and the judge, Jesus compares prayer — specifically constant, unwavering prayer — with the marginalized person who doggedly pursues her claim through an unforgiving legal system.

It's not a rosy or reassuring picture. So what is He trying to tell us?

Unlike a king or a parent, a judge has strictly drawn lines which he cannot, under any circumstances, cross. He can only help people who bring their case to court. Even good, earnest judges cannot render justice if charges are not brought.

God is all-powerful. But that doesn't make Him a meddler. He will not force His way into our problems. What would be the point? What is our life on earth for, if it is not to teach us how to turn willingly to God, in every instance — adoration, gratitude, need?


Today, I sat down and made a list of problems I don't pray about. When I was done, I looked at the list and asked myself: why not? Why don't I pray about these things? Some are huge issues over which I have absolutely no control, and prayer feels futile. Some are small grievances I never even considered mentioning to God.

If I prayed about them all, my life would be totally consumed by prayer. Constant, unwearyingly prayer. The kind of prayer Jesus calls me to in the parable of the widow and the judge: continual surrender of myself to the mysterious, limitless power of God.

Praying that way could make me tired. The widow was tired, too — but she kept bringing her charges. She got justice. And her judge wasn't even a nice guy.

So say the prayer. Bring the charges. Our judge is one who wants to help, but He won't overstep His bounds.





29th Sunday in Ordinary Time • Luke 18:1-8

**Gospel reflection:** What do you remember from today's reading? Jesus tells us a story about a bad judge and a widow who wants justice – who wants what is right. Judges are supposed to be fair and honest, but this isn't always the case. The prophets in the Bible were always getting angry with bad judges who thought more about themselves when making decisions than about the people who had been hurt by someone else's actions. And if the judges didn't sort out the problems fairly then people would suffer again and again. Can you think of things that seem unfair to you? How do you feel when someone has treated you unfairly? The widow was ignored by the law but she didn't give up. She just kept nagging the judge to make things right. Eventually, just to get rid of her, he gave her what she wanted, justice. Her prayers were finally answered.
