

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Who did you come to see? A version of this question is posed by Jesus many times in the Gospels. He asks it of Andrew and John when they begin to follow him. He asks it of Mary Magdalene in the garden of the resurrection. He asks it in today's Gospel. "What did you go out to the desert to see?" There is something innately human about "seeing." Animals have eyes — some with much more powerful vision than our own — but that's not the kind of seeing Jesus is talking about. We could phrase the question several other ways. "What are you looking for?" "What are you longing for?" "Whom do you seek?"

It is in seeing for ourselves that our suspicions or hypotheses are confirmed, that our desires discover their fulfillment, and that we can rest for a moment in certainty. John the Baptist sought certainty of Jesus' identity. "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" Jesus sends word to him based on the testimony of sight, observations of the mighty deeds Jesus has begun to work. "Go and tell John what you hear and see."

God recognizes our desire to *see*. In the Incarnation, the Word is made flesh. The invisible is made visible. The supernatural is made manifest in an infant who can do little more than the most natural of movements as he feeds, cries, sleeps. We don't need to wait for Christmas to see God. The work of God is all around us. Those blinded by sin "*regain their sight*." People overcome backgrounds of poverty and violence to make world-changing contributions. Addicts grow and heal. Truth is spoken, and people listen. Let's pray for the grace to see God's movement in our lives this week. How have you seen the work of God?

Children's Liturgy of the Word

Children's Liturgy of the Word is provided for all children in grades pre-k through 5th grade most Sundays at 10:30 a.m. Mass, from mid-September to mid-June.

There is no charge for this program and no registration is required. Children's Liturgy of the Word is ritual centered on the proclamation and breaking open of the Sunday scriptures. The children do what the rest of the community is doing only it is more appropriate to their level of understanding. Because it is a liturgical celebration, all the principles of liturgy (active participation, clear symbols, etc.) apply.

We also provide a weekly pamphlet, "*Explaining God's Word*," a take home resource that includes a reflection on the weekly Gospel, activities to enhance understanding, as well as a family page to help you in your efforts in teaching your child.

If your child is hesitant to participate and you wish to accompany them until they are comfortable attending, we invite you to do so. The children rejoin the assembly for the Liturgy Celebration of the Eucharist.

We invite adults to consider volunteering in this ministry. It is a minimal commitment and training is provided. We are also looking for some committed students, 6th grade and up, to join our team as assistants for the adult liturgists. Teens help lead the children into the school and assure they are all returned to their parents after the program as well as help meet the needs of the children while in the care of adults liturgists. PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Today we arrive at the **Third Sunday of Advent**, oftentimes referred to as **Gaudete**, or "**Rejoice Sunday**". Arriving at this mid-point of the Advent season serves as a reminder of the two-fold nature of Advent as a season of the already experienced and the yet to be experienced of God coming among us. This year, though Advent encompasses only about three and a half weeks, there is still enough Advent time to rejoice and prepare to celebrate the birth of Christ at Christmas.

The month of December can be a very busy and hectic time of year, finding many of us in the throes of Christmas preparation. Such busyness can cause us to lose sight of the profound spiritual importance of the Advent Christmas season. Recently, the International Catholic Stewardship Council offered some insights for us to help keep Christ in Christmas. You may find that you are already doing some of the following suggestions:

Give God a very special gift this year: Let His gift be something personal that no one else needs to know about, and let it be a sacrifice. Perhaps your gift will be to commit more time with God daily. Perhaps there is a habit you know you should give up. Why wait for a New Year's resolution? Start now.

Celebrate the season of Advent: Light the Advent wreath candles each evening before dinner. If you have children, let them offer their own prayers to the Christ child for whom we are waiting.

Set aside some special time to read the Christmas story in the gospel of St. Luke 1:5-56 through 2:1-20: Consider reading this account with your family and discussing it together.

Put up a crèche in your home: Consider having one set that is "kid-proof" which your children are allowed to handle. Kids love to make the Nativity story their own, and they especially love angels!

Plan a project to help someone this Christmas: Identify someone with a genuine need, involve your whole family and see how happy you can make someone this Christmas

Take a group Christmas caroling to a nursing home or hospital: Get people together. Make it festive. Bring the gifts of your joyful smiles and voices to those who need these gifts.

Give a surprise gift of service to each member of your family: The idea of giving an unexpected gift of service to members of your family reveals your own love and concern for them. You might consider giving your spouse a day away, running an errand for your brother, or cleaning out a closet for your mother. Make it personal and meaningful.

Send Christmas cards and thank you notes that convey a spiritual message: This is an easy way to share your faith during the Advent season. Don't just sign your name! Include a personal message with each card. Set aside some time after Christmas day to write thank you notes and help your children to write thank you notes for the gifts they receive. This is a wonderful habit for a lifetime, and a good way to foster gratitude for all gifts.


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REFLECTION

JESSE TREE

Advent is a season of preparation before Christmas. The word Advent means "coming" and refers to the coming of Jesus. The season emphasizes a three fold coming, the coming in the flesh at Bethlehem, in grace through word and sacrament, and in glory in the day of judgment.

Many people go to great lengths to prepare for Christmas, yet fail to appreciate the true meaning of Advent. Advent, when properly observed, helps you realize more fully the coming of Christ and its meaning for you.

Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas and lasts until Christmas Eve. The lessons read in church each Sunday of the season picture some of the people and events that are significant in the heritage of Jesus.

The Jesse tree has the same purpose, but it expands it by presenting an appropriate story in picture for each day of the season. The Jesse tree is a small tree decorated with symbols portraying the spiritual heritage of Jesus. It is a kind of family tree that was suggested by Isaiah's prophet: "a shoot shall come out of the stump of Jesse" (Isaiah 11:1). Our Jesse tree is located in the seasonal shrine. Each day a different symbol of Jesus' heritage will be placed on the tree. We welcome you to step into the shrine and turn over the corresponding scripture for the third week.
