



PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

The Christmas and New Year holidays for 2019 are now history! As a church and as a society, we spend so much time preparing for the major holidays and they pass ever so quickly! In a few days, we will begin packing Christmas decorations away for yet another year. The Christmas holidays are always special, and not one holiday goes by without each of us writing a new memory. Think for a moment - what was your favorite Christmas remembrance this year? If we try to remember everything, we will remember very little. When we focus on one event or incident, that moment becomes special and we wrap it in memory.

As a parish, we are grateful for so much! The numbers of people who filled our church for our Christmas Masses tells us that the faith is still alive and there are many, many people who share with us the belief that at one moment in time heaven and earth became one. The excitement of children, especially at the 3:00 p.m. Christmas Eve Family Mass, was a blessing to all. Many of the children were in constant motion, expecting Santa overnight, happy to be with family and friends, and dressed up in their Christmas finery. It was wonderful to share exciting moments with them. I also found it very touching to see the number of people who quietly knelt at the Christmas Crib after Mass, simply looking at each of the figures at the crèche and quietly praying. More than once, I thought that this is the real meaning of this day and was so glad that people took the time to remember this fact.

Another blessing that was so evident during the Advent/ Christmas season was our parish Christmas basket and food program. At last count, our parish sponsored over 200 families this Christmas, a few more families from 2018. It was an edifying sight to see so many of our parishioners from all age ranges, taking a tag from the Christmas Giving trees, purchasing gifts, and bringing food each week for the Christmas baskets. Many gathered Friday evening to sort the food, and again on Saturday morning as the Christmas baskets were packed for pick up later Saturday afternoon and Sunday. By Sunday afternoon, all the baskets had been picked up or were on their way to their grateful recipients. While it is impossible to measure the generosity of those who were part of our Christmas basket program, the ranks of those who took part in this effort ranged from school age children to those of senior vintage. Thank you to the members of our Social Ministry Committee for yet another excellent job in coordinating this important annual parish outreach effort. Thank you one and all!

I also wish to take a moment to thank all who contributed to the beauty and solemnity of our Christmas liturgies. Thanks to our liturgical ministers for their generous ministry during Christmas. When we think of the term 'liturgical minister', we often times think of our lectors, extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist, and acolytes. Another important ministry that is oftentimes overlooked is that of our ushers/greeters. Many of our regular parishioners, as well as our visitors are high in their commendation of our ushers and greeters. Very often, they are the first ones to greet people with a smile and a word of welcome when they come in the door. They are the ones who "set-the-stage" for people coming to Mass. I dare to think of the chaos that would reign, especially during our crowded Christmas Masses, if it were not for our usher's and greeter's hospitality expertise. I also wish to thank those who work quietly behind the scenes, those who serve as sacristans and all who helped decorate our church.

What would the Christmas season be without good Christmas music? I would like to thank the members of our Adult Choir, Youth Choir, Children's Choir, adult and youth instrumentalists, who spend countless hours rehearsing, and those rehearsals produced wonderful results. RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS Children's Liturgy of the Word

Children's Liturgy of the Word is provided for all children in grades pre-k through 5th grade most Sundays at 10:30 a.m. Mass, from mid-September to mid-June.

There is no charge for this program and no registration is required. Children's Liturgy of the Word is ritual centered on the proclamation and breaking open of the Sunday scriptures. The children do what the rest of the community is doing only it is more appropriate to their level of understanding. Because it is a liturgical celebration, all the principles of liturgy (active participation, clear symbols, etc.) apply.

We also provide a weekly pamphlet, *"Explaining God's Word,"* a take home resource that includes a reflection on the weekly Gospel, activities to enhance understanding, as well as a family page to help you in your efforts in teaching your child.

If your child is hesitant to participate and you wish to accompany them until they are comfortable attending, we invite you to do so. The children rejoin the assembly for the Liturgy Celebration of the Eucharist.

We invite adults to consider volunteering in this ministry. It is a minimal commitment and training is We are also looking for some committed provided. students, 6th grade and up, to join our team as assistants for the adult liturgists. Teens help lead the children into the school and assure they are all returned to their parents after the program as well as help meet the needs of the children while in the care of adult liturgists. EVERY DAY STEWARDSHIP Recognize God in Your Ordinary Moments

God's glory, now, is kindled gentler than candlelight under the rafters of a barn: Eternal Peace is sleeping in the hay, And Wisdom's born in secret in a straw-roofed stable.*

When I was younger, I wrote music to and recorded Thomas Merton's poem, "Epiphany Carol." If you have never read it, search it out on the internet. Merton's words are profound and paint a picture of the awesomeness of Jesus, the newborn King of Kings, lying in a simple straw bed. The shepherds and Wise Men are drawn to pay homage to the One who has been born above all others and brings with him hope for a broken world.

As Merton correctly points out, the gifts we are called to bring to this baby and lay at his feet are our prayers and penances, next to those gifts of worldly wealth. What is it that you have to bring to the stable on this feast of the Epiphany of the Lord? Unless those prayers and penances lead to a new way of living, our gifts will be void of meaning. What we lay before him speaks to the change in us that he has given to us by his birth. Our daily stewardship is resembled in those gifts. If we are to truly echo the kingdom of God in our lives and actions, what we ultimately offer to him is no less than our entire selves. This baby will give his entire self for us, and his work must continue through our hands and feet.

> While we unnumbered children of the wicked centuries Come after with our penances and prayers, And lay them down in the sweet-smelling hay Beside the wise men's golden jars.*
