

FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

What does it mean to be salt and light? If we listen carefully to Jesus' words, we gain some direction. To be salt means to bring taste, zest, and joy to life. We are asked to liven things up a bit by allowing the joy of our faith to spill over into the lives of others. Only a sincere and deep relationship with God can freshen up humanity and set it on proper course. To be light means that our faith must translate into action so that we can be Christ for others and extend the same arm of mercy and compassion that Christ did. Our acts of piety, then, cannot be directed solely at ourselves. Prayer is never about self-benefit but must always be directed toward union with God, deepening our relationships with one another and learning how to be effective stewards of the beautiful universe God has entrusted to our care.

The Master gives us wise direction in terms of how we can best become the salt and light he desires. Listen carefully to the Beatitudes. Think about the oppression and alienation that exists in our world, the violence and prejudice, the anger and the hatred, the fear and the shame. All of these things require action. The poor need food, housing, and clothes. Hatred must be replaced by love. Retaliation and violence by forgiveness. Our thoughts and speech can become more like Christ. We can change and continue to change. Blessed John Henry Cardinal Newman said, "To live is to change and to be perfect is to have changed often."

But it doesn't end with just offering the bandages needed to heal wounds. It must go deeper. We must ask ourselves what has happened that we have found ourselves in this place with these wounds and divisions. What are their causes? Together we must address these systemic problems, politically and spiritually, and face the truth. Only then will we truly be salt and light. But then again, we may not like what the light shows us.

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Today is Public Policy Sunday. It is a time each February when the Diocese of Rochester advocates for causes which are in need of the church's support and advocacy. This year, we are asked to lend our support to the improvement of palliative and hospice care while objecting to the legalization of physician assisted suicide.

Our faith calls us to uphold the dignity and value of human life until its natural end. Church teaching requires that we accept ordinary medical treatments, those that offer a reasonable hope to benefit without excessive burden. But it does not require that we suffer an agonizing long and painful death. On the contrary: overly burdensome treatments that provide little or no benefit to patients are not morally required.

Proposed legislation in New York would allow physicians to legally prescribe a deadly dose of medication at the request of a patient with a terminal diagnosis. While proponents may call it "death with dignity" or "aid in dying," in reality these proposals would authorize the direct and intentional taking of human life.

Physicians and healers and their profession are guided by the principle, "first, do no harm." Physician assisted suicide will blur longstanding medical, moral, and legal distinctions between withdrawing extraordinary medical assistance and taking active steps to destroy human life. The former removes burdensome or useless treatments, allowing nature to take its course, and allowing the patient to either live or die. The latter is a deliberate and direct act of taking a patient's life.

Both the American Medical Association and the Medical Society of the State of New York hold policy positions against physician-assisted suicide.

As Christians, we are called to reach out in love, compassion, and support to those experiencing illness and suffering, not to abandon them during their time of need. Those experiencing suffering at the end of life should have full access to palliative care, which eases physical pain while honoring the dignity of the patient.

This weekend members of our Social Ministry Committee will have petitions available asking for your support for the improvement of palliative and hospice care, while opposing the legalization of physician suicide. Funding for Energy Efficiency and Critical Capital Needs in Catholic Schools

Next to salary and benefits for personnel, the costs for energy and facility maintenance/repair are among the largest portions of school budgets. But unlike public school counterparts, religious and independent schools do not receive state building aid, nor do they have the authority to levy taxes or issue bonds to finance energy efficiency or other important capital projects. Although energy-saving improvements can pay for themselves over time, the up-front costs are often out of reach for cash-strapped schools. Maintaining Catholic Schools is not only good for the students and their families, it saves taxpayers the cost of educating those students.

The Diocese of Rochester with the NYS Catholic Conference urges a \$200 million appropriation in the next state budget for critical projects at religious and independent schools and an energy efficient grant/loan program (\$75 million) to provide seed money for energy efficiency projects. Those schools utilizing the loan fund would repay the grants with the savings they achieve in energy efficiency.

This initiative is consistent with the Diocese of Rochester's action/advocacy to respond to the call of Pope Francis in his encyclical, *Laudata Si: On Care For Our Common Home*, and is consistent with the New York State renewable energy and conservation goals to address climate change.

REGIONAL EVENTS SIGN TODAY TO OPPOSE PHYSICIAN ASSISTED SUICIDE

The New York State Legislature is under increasing pressure to pass legislation that would legalize physician assisted suicide for patients diagnosed with a terminal illness. Medical professionals, who have chosen a vocation dedicated to the service of life, would assist in the termination of the very lives they have pledged to heal and to comfort at life's most critical moments. As Catholics, we believe that the lives of people who are gravely ill or facing death are no less valuable than others.

The New York State Catholic Conference (NYSCC) has joined with those in the medical community, disability rights community, and other faith-based groups to stand for the dignity of every human life and oppose this legislation that fails those at such a vulnerable stage of life. As Catholics we should seek "to maintain New York State's current prohibition on assisted suicide while ensuring increased support, resources, palliative and hospice care, appropriate pain relief and treatment for the terminally ill."

Take time today after Mass to sign the petition to let Governor Cuomo and your New York State legislators know that you oppose legislation to legalize physician assisted suicide in NYS.

Valentines for Vets

Valentines for Vets is a thirteen year old local project that supports veterans at the Bath VA Medical Center and beyond. The purpose of this project is to wish veterans a Happy Valentine's Day as well as thank them for their service and sacrifice. Last year, over 600 valentines were delivered to the VA Center and personally shared with the veterans. Children from St. Mary Our Mother School, Faith Formation classes, parish families, and seniors from Bethany Courtyards all created valentines. We also received valentines from the Key Club at Edison and a parish family collected over 200 valentines from Big Flats Elementary and the Elks Club and delivered them as a family at the event. Our Social Ministry committee would like to continue to have our parish family be involved in this project.

We ask that you create handmade cards, letters, and posters thanking our veterans for their service and wishing them a Happy Valentine's Day. Please use the salutation Dear Veteran or Thank You Veteran and do not include last names or personal photos. A red box has been placed on the table across from the bulletin board to drop your valentines in. Valentines will be collected in January and into February.
