THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

We give the definition of ourselves over to so many things. We allow our society, friends, family, work, social groups, ethnicity, and even institutions define, classify, and color how we perceive ourselves. When we listen predominantly to the voices of others, we lose touch with what is happening within our own inner voice. If we listen carefully within, we can easily discover that we are in want and need. We know our incompleteness and also know that loneliness, sadness, and self-images can propel us outward in attempts to fill those gaps. We can become not only victims of our own prejudices but can find ourselves overly self-indulgent in things that can only satisfy for a short time, if at all.

It is no wonder that money and power are things that are so fervently sought after. As long as we can keep a steady supply going, the illusion of fulfillment and satisfaction can falsely persuade us as craftily as a master magician's act. We live with illusions not truth. Whether we admit it, the lies we live and pursue will ultimately expose our superficiality. We all have to wrestle with who we are and what gives our lives purpose and meaning. Learn to listen more deeply, not to what others are saying about you, but to what God is echoing in your heart.

We can easily get confused and misunderstand, not only about who we are but who God is. Even the disciples and the Samaritan woman at the well missed the point Jesus was trying to make. There is only one Person who can satisfy the deepest yearnings and longings of our hearts — Jesus the Messiah. We continue to resist acknowledging this and are happier in our world of misunderstanding and illusion. The lifegiving water we truly need doesn't come from the source of a well but from the Source of Life. Only God can reveal the truth of our sinfulness, the superficiality of our pursuits, and the illusions we hold so dear. Only Jesus can save us from ourselves and give us what we really need. If only our heads can catch up with where our hearts know they need to be, then will we find real contentment and life!

Lenten Regulations

During Lent, the regulations for fast and abstinence are: all Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence. Good Friday is a day of fasting;

All persons who are fourteen years of age or older are bound by the law of abstinence;

All persons between the ages of 18 and 59, inclusive, are bound by the law of fasting;

Catholics are especially encouraged to perform acts of penance during the season of Lent.

Abstinence - refrain from eating meat at all meals that day.

Fasting - only one full meal, the other two meals small enough that together they do not equal one full meal.

The season of Lent began on Ash Wednesday and continues through to Holy Thursday. Good Friday has its own rule of fast and abstinence.

Do You Know ...?

Do you know that our parish has a lending library right in our church building? It includes a vast collection of religious books on a wide variety of topics such as faith, Scripture, Mary and the saints, Eucharist, forgiveness, family life, the Catholic Church and more. The books, which are arranged by topic, are located in the west end of the vestibule on the book cases across from the reconciliation rooms.

Lent is a special time where we are called to spiritual growth. A book on a religious topic might be a great companion on your Lenten journey. It can act as a springboard for reflection and prayer and might just be what you need to enrich and refresh your faith this Lenten season. Take time to browse through the books and choose one to take home. When you are done with the book, just return it to the bookshelf.

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

In the Lenten schedule published on the front cover of our bulletin, you will notice the diocesan-wide *Day of Penance and Mercy* which is scheduled for **Wednesday**, **April 1st**. On that day, all parishes throughout the diocese will be "Open for Forgiveness," affording people an opportunity to celebrate the **Sacrament of Penance** individually. A priest will be available for this sacrament in church from 12:00 to 7:00 p.m.

If you haven't celebrated the Sacrament of Penance recently, you may be wondering how to examine your conscience. You can use the Ten Commandments as a guide, or read the Sermon on the Mount in the gospel of Matthew, chapters five to seven. Another way would be to reflect on the four-fold relationships in your life; your relationship with God, yourself, others and the world.

Regarding your **relationship with God**, are you praying regularly? Do you read the scriptures regularly? Is Sunday Mass a priority in your week's schedule? Do you try to live your life with an attitude of thanksgiving since God is the source of all we have? Are you deepening the spiritual side of your life with a strong daily relationship with God?

Regarding your **relationship with yourself**, are you taking good care of your health, physically, emotionally, and intellectually? Do you abuse food, alcohol or drugs? Do you develop and use your talents God has given you, no matter how great or small you may consider them to be? Do you nurture healthy and honest friendships and personal relationships? Have you committed yourself to some volunteer work or service that gets you outside yourself and gives you a purpose, something that will benefit others in need?

Regarding your **relationship with others**, what is the quality of your relationship with family members, coworkers, fellow students, or the people you associate with every day? Is there someone you need to forgive or ask for forgiveness? Do you speak to friend and foe alike with respect and charity, or do you gossip and pass along mere rumors and innuendos? Are you just in your dealings with others? Have you honored the commitments you have made to others in marriage and family life, in business, in the parish? Are you committed to building a strong sense of community in your neighborhood, community, workplace, and parish?

Regarding your **relationship with the world**, do you recognize that you are part of something larger than yourself, and try to live responsibly in light of that fact? Are you an active member in the social and political processes, like neighborhood associations, schools, voting, and other causes which support a healthy way of life for all and the common good? Do you play your part in caring for the earth and its natural resources? Do your actions witness to a lifestyle in which others are more important than yourself? Do you share your time, talent, and treasure with people who are in need in a spirit of real joy and thanksgiving?

These thoughts do not cover everything, but they should get us started. The living of our faith is a constant challenge and proposition. At any time, sin can filter into any aspect of relationships in our lives, with a need to recognize the sin and root it out. I hope these questions
