FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

"Do you believe in the Son of Man?" Jesus wants to motivate each one of us to see the truth. After developing a relationship with Jesus, the blind man "sees" as someone very special. The Pharisees, due to the blindness caused by their ignorance, prejudice, and need for self-preservation, still remain blind. Presuppositions, prejudices, assumptions, and our needs can easily blind us to truth. We see what we want or need to see and not what is really there. In addition, our stubbornness continues to convince us that we are right and that our vision is perfect. Only God can complete the picture.

Look around at our world. So much of what is happening today is due to the reluctance of folks to allow themselves to be stretched and brought to see what is really there. Many react to what life presents to them more with the lenses of ignorance than lenses of clarity. The Gospel carries great transformative value. With it, God corrects our vision and replaces our limited sight with the fullness of His sight. God opens our eyes so that we can see that it is not about preserving what we have created but of living in the immensity and wonder of God's kingdom.

Through a simple, loving relationship with God, we can break through the tethers of prejudice, eradicate fear, dispel the darkness of hatred and sin, discover freedom, live in peace, work for justice, be effective stewards of creation, assist the migrant and the immigrant, and safeguard our economic systems and policies so that they truly serve all of God's children. What we see is often an artificial lie. Our truth is much bigger than what our limited sight believes it to be. Allow God to work in and through you. Do not be afraid. Be open and be humble enough to know that you need help. Many human beings are living with severe cataracts that produce sight that is at best blurred. Are you one of them?

Lenten Regulations

During Lent, the regulations for fast and abstinence are: all Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence. Good Friday is a day of fasting;

All persons who are fourteen years of age or older are bound by the law of abstinence;

All persons between the ages of 18 and 59, inclusive, are bound by the law of fasting;

Catholics are especially encouraged to perform acts of penance during the season of Lent.

Abstinence - refrain from eating meat at all meals that day.

Fasting - only one full meal, the other two meals small enough that together they do not equal one full meal.

The season of Lent began on Ash Wednesday and continues through to Holy Thursday. Good Friday has its own rule of fast and abstinence.

Do You Know...?

Do you know that our parish has a lending library right in our church building? It includes a vast collection of religious books on a wide variety of topics such as faith, Scripture, Mary and the saints, Eucharist, forgiveness, family life, the Catholic Church and more. The books, which are arranged by topic, are located in the west end of the vestibule on the book cases across from the reconciliation rooms.

Lent is a special time where we are called to spiritual growth. A book on a religious topic might be a great companion on your Lenten journey. It can act as a springboard for reflection and prayer and might just be what you need to enrich and refresh your faith this Lenten season. Take time to browse through the books and choose one to take home. When you are done with the book, just return it to the bookshelf.

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PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Today, I would like to share with you an article recently sent to me concerning the COVID-19, the Coronavirus Disease. It was written by **Dr. James Robb, M.D.**, a pathologist who once served on the staff of the University of California San Diego. Dr. Robb offers some insights on precautions which we should practice as we deal with this pandemic.

Here are the precautions that I take and will take. These same precautions I currently use during our influenza seasons, except for the mask and gloves:

1. NO HANDSHAKING! Use a fist bump, slight bow, elbow bump, etc.

2. Use ONLY your knuckle to touch light switches, elevator buttons, etc. Lift the gasoline dispenser with a paper towel or use a disposable glove.

3. Open doors with your closed fist or hip - do not grasp the handle with your hand, unless there is no other way to open the door. Especially important on bathroom and post office/commercial doors.

4. Use disinfectant wipes at stores when they are available, including wiping the handle and child seats in grocery carts.

5. Wash your hands with soap for at least 20 seconds, using the "surgical scrub" method, and/or use a greater than 60% alcohol-based hand sanitizer whenever you return home from ANY activity that involved locations where other people have been.

6. Keep a bottle of sanitizer available at each of your home's entrances AND in your car for use after getting gas or touching other contaminated objects when you can't immediately wash your hands.

7. If possible, cough or sneeze into a disposable tissue and discard. Use your elbow only if you have to. The clothing on your elbows will contain infectious virus that can be passed on for up to a week or more.

What I have stocked in preparation for the pandemic spread to the U.S.

1. Latex or nitrate disposable gloves for use when going shopping, using the gas pump, and all other outside activity when you come in contact with contaminated areas.

2. Stock up now with disposable surgical masks and use them to prevent you from touching your nose and/or mouth. (We touch our nose/mouth 90 times a day with out knowing it!) This is the only way this virus can infect you - it is lung specific. The mask will not prevent the virus in a direct sneeze from getting into your nose or mouth - it is only to keep you from touching your nose or mouth.

3. Stock up now with hand sanitizers and latex/ nitrile gloves (get the appropriate sizes for your family). The hand sanitizers must be alcohol based and greater than 60% alcohol.

4. Stock up now with zinc lozenges. These have been proven to be effective in blocking coronavirus (and most other viruses) from multiplying in your throat and nasopharynx. Use as directed several times a day when you begin to feel ANY cold-like symptoms beginning. It is best to lie down and let the lozenge dissolve in the back of your throat and nasopharynx. Cold-Ease lozenges is one brand available, but there are other brands available.

I hope you found Dr. Robb's information helpful as we continue to face the COVIC-19 pandemic. As we continue our Lenten journey, let us keep one another in our thoughts and prayers. See you in church!
