

GOSPEL MEDITATION Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Grace and sin, belief and unbelief, good and evil all exist together. While we wrestle with these two dimensions of reality inwardly, they are also witnessed in the actions and words of others. Many, all too often, beat themselves up because of their sin. We are also all too quick to pass judgment on others whom we perceive to be in error and walking down a wrong path. God does not make rash judgments, nor should we. Patience is the order of the day as is an understanding that God is ultimately the caller of the shots.

Our faith tells us that while God allows the wheat and the weeds to coexist, the wheat will always triumph. As long as we can cultivate even a little faith and a small measure of desire for God, He can produce abundant blessings and good things. Even when the weeds seem to have triumphed, there still may be a small measure of faith remaining that can be cultivated and grown. It doesn't take much! Unless a person totally allows the weeds to reign, there is always to be found at least a small measure of faith, good, light, and love. With even this small portion, God can produce abundant growth.

Admittedly, it is easy to give into the weeds, and they grow very quickly. Any gardener knows this to be true. Sometimes, the weeds even seem more attractive and vibrant. Dealing with weeds can quickly become a losing battle, and they can look healthier and grow faster than the very plants we are trying to protect. It's easy to give into them and let them win. While God will deal with all things in due time, we are responsible for keeping things in check in the short term. It is our task to keep our eyes fixed on God's presence and mercy. We are asked to avoid judgment. And, it is not our responsibility to deal with the weeds in someone else's garden, only our own. One garden is enough responsibility for anyone.

Weeds have power. We have to realize this. While they can appear attractive and healthy, they can quickly choke us off from God's presence. Our task is one of maintenance and cultivating a desire for God. Even the smallest kernel of faith can grow into something wonderful. In God's time, the eternal harvest will come, and we will no longer have to worry about the weeds.

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

This weekend will mark the third weekend we have been back in our church building for Mass. We are still recording the Saturday afternoon Mass that can be accessed on our parish website. The total Mass attendance for the part two weekends has been approximately 180 people. The average attendance prior to the coronavirus pandemic was anywhere between 700 to 900, depending on the season of the year or if a special event, such as First Communion, is taking place. But one most asked question that I have heard in recent weeks is: *"Is it safe to return to church?"*

For those who ask that question, there are a variety of answers. What I can tell you is that we are following, to the letter, all the safety recommendations from both the U. S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC), as well as the guidelines and protocols issued by the Diocese of Rochester. The church building is thoroughly cleaned and sanitized every day, including the chapel area where daily Mass is celebrated. After each Mass, the pews, door handles, bathrooms, and any other "touchable" surfaces are cleaned and sanitized. In addition, we are limiting the attendance at Mass to 33% of our church capacity, which is about 140 people. The pews have been "roped off" to allow safe distancing for all. A face mask is required of all. The Eucharistic Ministers, including myself, sanitize our hands at least twice during the liturgy. I may have missed something for this list, but the point is that we are doing everything we can to ensure your good health and safety when you come to church.

I also understand that everyone in the parish is not getting any younger, as well as parishioners with conditions that compromise their health. A number of people with whom I am in contact on a daily basis throughout this pandemic, have stated to me that it will be a very long time until they will feel comfortable to return to church. In no way do they want to compromise their health, or the health of family members they are in regular contact with. We can even look to the world of professional sports, and their attempts to bring these sports back. It is interesting to note the number of players who either test positive for the coronavirus, or who have opted out for the 2020 season. Once again, I remind you that the obligation to attend Sunday Mass has been suspended until further notice. Please know that whatever decision you make in this regard, you have my unconditional support. Be at peace with your decision.

We continue to navigate through a great deal of uncertainty as we face the challenges of this pandemic. Please be assured that your patience and understanding are appreciated.

GUIDELINES FOR MASS ATTENDANCE

We ask that you register each week for the Mass you will be attending, as we need to limit the size of the congregation to 33% of our church seating capacity, approximately 140 people. Please call the parish office or email <u>smomc@stny.rr.com</u> no later than **Thursday** at **4:00 p.m.** Remember that the obligation to attend Sunday Mass has been suspended until further notice.

To prepare to attend:

Wash your hands before you leave home.

Bring a face covering or mask; masks are required from the time you exit your car in the parking lot until you return to your car. (This also applies to private prayer in church.)

Bring your own hand sanitizer to use before receiving Communion.

Bring your own worship materials, as no hymnals or missalettes are available.

Please do not congregate in the church building or anywhere on the campus.

One restroom is available, but do not congregate around it.

When you arrive:

Please plan to arrive 10-15 minutes before Mass, and check with the person at the registration table.

Ushers will be available to help you.

You can deposit your offering envelope in the receptacle near the doors when you arrive. There will not be a collection at the offertory.

Please sanitize your hands at one of the stations as you enter church.

You will be directed to a seat in church, with seating beginning in the front to the back.

The chapel remains closed at this time.

During Mass:

Generally, there will be little congregational singing, as masks must **<u>always</u>** be worn throughout Mass.

There will be no acolytes, altar servers or choir, one lector, one Eucharistic Minister, one cantor, when needed.

There is to be no physical contact during the Lord's Prayer or at the Sign of Peace.

When approaching to receive Communion, please follow the directions of the ushers or volunteers present. Remain six feet apart from others, observing the markings on the floor.

As you receive Communion, receive Communion in your hands (there is no safe or hygienic manner to receive Communion on the tongue during the pandemic), walk at least six feet away from the minister before lowering your mask to receive the host, replace your mask, and return to your seat. The Eucharist will only be offered in the form of the Body of Christ.

You are not obliged to receive Communion at Mass if you are uncomfortable doing so. If you are not receiving Communion, simply step out of your seat and back away to allow others to return to their seat with minimal contact.

Going forth:

At the end of Mass, the priest will go immediately to the sacristy, and the ushers will direct you to exit from the church building, beginning with the last pew first.

Private prayer is not available after Mass as to

facilitate immediate cleaning and sanitizing of the pews and restrooms.

Please go directly to your vehicle when you leave church, with no socializing in the Church, side walks, or in the parking lots.

Thank you for your understanding and cooperation as we work our way through this phased reopening process. We thank you for your suggestions as we move forward!
