REFLECT

FIRST READING

After Israel's return from their captivity in Babylon, Isaiah prophesied the Lord's salvation to all people of faith and good will, not just Israel. Why do you think some people resist the idea of God's impartiality?

SECOND READING

Paul sees the rejection of Jesus by the Jews as the vehicle for God's mercy to all, both Jew and Gentile alike. When has God turned a negative into a positive in your life?

GOSPEL READING

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Some time ago, I was invited to a birthday celebration where the guest of honor was turning seventy years old. As a youth many years ago, I couldn't believe that anyone could be that old, but it happened! There is an observation that people are not as old as they used to be at age sixty-five, let alone seventy. My father was sixty-five when he passed, and I was only thirty-three. My father was very active and vital up to his death, so I really never considered him to be 'old'. It is not that way today! As many of my peers are approaching age seventy, I really don't consider them to be old at all. Of course, none of us can move as quickly as we did in our youth,, but all of us hope that we have many years ahead of us before God calls us home.

Which brings me to this observation. I am impressed by the many people in our parish who don't act their age, where the word 'old' does not apply to them because they are young at heart. These people are a real force in the life of our parish, and a source of tremendous good, as they use their gifts and talents in serving the needs of others. These people are a blessing, an inspiration, and a great source of affirmation.

As time marches on for all of us, we need to be reminded that age does not mean a lack of effectiveness. Here are just a few examples of people who accomplished great achievements past the age of sixty:

Katherine Graham: The first publisher of the

- Washington Post and Pulitzer Prize winner at age 80.
- John Glenn: The first man to orbit the earth in the early 1960's; after a successful Congressional career, returned to space once again at age 70+.
- **President Jimmy Carter:** Inspiring work with Habitat for Humanity age 95.
- **Evangelist Billy Graham:** Preached to great multitudes up until his recent death age 80+.
- **Pablo Casals:** When asked by a young report, "Why do you still practice 6 hours a day, he said, because I am still making progress." Age 95+.
- **President Ronald Reagan:** Elected President at age 70; he completed two terms as President and is credited with ending the cold war and renewing confidence in enduring American values. He died at 93.
- Mother Teresa: Received the Nobel Peace Prize for her work with the poor in Calcutta. Age 69.
- Vin Scully: Broadcaster and the "Voice of the Los Angeles Dodgers", broadcasted Dodgers games for 67 years and 'retired' at age 88.

IN OUR PARISH

Recorded Masses on Website

If you are unable to attend our re-opened Masses, or are uncomfortable doing so because of the pandemic, please note that the 5:00 p.m. Mass each Saturday is recorded and is available on our website. Click on "Mass Schedule" in the upper right hand corner to access.

GUIDELINES FOR MASS ATTENDANCE

We ask that you register each week for the Mass you will be attending, as we need to limit the size of the congregation to 33% of our church seating capacity, approximately 150 people. Please call the parish office or email <u>smomc@stny.rr.com</u> no later than **Thursday** at **4:00 p.m.** Remember that the obligation to attend Sunday Mass has been suspended until further notice.

To prepare to attend:

Wash your hands before you leave home.

Bring a face covering or mask; masks are required from the time you exit your car in the parking lot until you return to your car. (This also applies to private prayer in church.)

Bring your own hand sanitizer to use before receiving Communion.

Bring your own worship materials, as no hymnals or missalettes are available.

Please do not congregate in the church building or anywhere on the campus.

One restroom is available, but do not congregate around it.

When you arrive:

Please plan to arrive 10-15 minutes before Mass, and check with the person at the registration table.

Ushers will be available to help you.

You can deposit your offering envelope in the receptacle near the doors when you arrive. There will not be a collection at the offertory.

Please sanitize your hands at one of the stations as you enter church.

You will be directed to a seat in church, with seating beginning in the front to the back.

The chapel remains closed at this time.

During Mass:

Generally, there will be little congregational singing, as masks must **<u>always</u>** be worn throughout Mass.

There will be no acolytes, altar servers or choir, one lector, one Eucharistic Minister, one cantor, when needed.

There is to be no physical contact during the Lord's Prayer or at the Sign of Peace.

When approaching to receive Communion, please follow the directions of the ushers or volunteers present. Remain six feet apart from others, observing the markings on the floor.

As you receive Communion, receive Communion in your hands (there is no safe or hygienic manner to receive Communion on the tongue during the pandemic), walk at least six feet away from the minister before lowering your mask to receive the host, replace your mask, and return to your seat. The Eucharist will only be offered in the form of the Body of Christ.

You are not obliged to receive Communion at Mass if you are uncomfortable doing so. If you are not receiving Communion, simply step out of your seat and back away to allow others to return to their seat with minimal contact.

Going forth:

At the end of Mass, the priest will go immediately to the sacristy, and the ushers will direct you to exit from the church building, beginning with the last pew first.

Private prayer is not available after Mass as to

facilitate immediate cleaning and sanitizing of the pews and restrooms.

Please go directly to your vehicle when you leave church, with no socializing in the Church, side walks, or in the parking lots.

Thank you for your understanding and cooperation as we work our way through this phased reopening process. We thank you for your suggestions as we move forward!
