



PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Today we celebrate the **Baptism of the Lord**, which brings the liturgical season of Advent/ Christmas/Epiphany to a close. This time each year, there is a sense of sadness when it comes to taking down the flowing lights and festive seasonal decorations of Christmas. As the popular saying goes, "time marches on," and our church's liturgical calendar unfolds into the fullness of time, but it is bittersweet to say farewell to the Christmas season, even Christmas 2020! It is my hope that you were able to celebrate and enjoy Christmas even in the midst of the pandemic. Perhaps as a result of the restrictions imposed on so many this year, perhaps some new Christmas traditions and practices were incorporated into our Christmas celebrations.

Because of early bulletin deadlines for bulletins of the past three weeks - last Sunday's bulletin went to press on December 23rd, we were still anticipating Christmas. While our Christmas Masses were much less festive than in previous years, and Christmas Mass attendance was down significantly due to the coronavirus pandemic, we still were able to gather together to celebrate Christmas with those who were able and chose to join us.

Today's celebration of the Baptism of the Lord reminds us of the new life given to all of us through baptism, a bond that unites us as God's chosen and holy people. That relationship began for each of us on our baptismal day, the occasion when we were cleansed of sin, given the new life of Christ, and welcomed into His holy people, the Church. As children of God through baptism, we are called to embrace a life-giving and life-long relationship with Christ. It is a relationship which invites us to continually grow in our faith

On December 8th, Pope Francis I declared The Year of Saint Joseph. It began on December 8, 2020 and will conclude on December 8, 2021. During this year, we are invited to focus on Joseph the Patron Saint of the Universal Church; Joseph the foster father of Jesus (the Son of God); Joseph the husband of Mary; Joseph, the man of faith; Joseph, protector of the Holy Family; Joseph the dreamer; and Joseph the Patron of a Happy Death! You may recall that when Francis I was elected Pope, he placed his ministry under the patronage of Saint Joseph. It was at that time that he directed that Joseph's name be added to the Eucharistic Prayer so that his intercession could be mentioned at every Mass. I have had a special devotion to Saint Joseph throughout my life in many ways. I chose Joseph as my Confirmation name when I was confirmed. Joseph is also the middle name of my father, as well as the middle name of my brothers, Daniel and Edward. A priest who played an influential part in my life was also named Joseph, Father Joseph T. Gaynor, who served as the pastor the St. Charles Borromeo Church in Elmira Heights for nearly twenty years. The rector of St. Bernard's Seminary, the four years I studied there was also a Joseph, Father Joseph P. Brennan. Finally,

the bishop who ordained me to both the diaconate and the priesthood in 1978 was another Joseph, Bishop Joseph L. Hogan. So the name Joseph is very dear to me.

Saint Joseph was very integral to the Holy Family, where he was a protector, guide, and provider. His job as a carpenter was one that was easily adapted where God would head them to live - Bethlehem, Egypt, or Nazareth. Joseph was a man of faith, and with Mary would have been the first teachers of Jesus in the Jewish faith and his way of life. With Mary, Joseph would have been the closest individual in helping Jesus to understand the plan that God had for Him. There is not a great amount of information written about Joseph, but we can say that Joseph was the primary male influence for Jesus in His early years. We continue to honor Saint Joseph as a person of great faith. You will be hearing about The Year of Saint Joseph in the months ahead.

THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

We need history. We need it in order to understand ourselves, personally and collectively. The pieces of our histories may not have always been the most positive, honest, exemplary, dignified, proud and best moments of our lives, but they are ours. We have to acknowledge, remember, accept, and often heal them. We cannot forget them or pretend that they never existed. As horrible as the atrocities of events like Auschwitz, brutal injustices committed throughout the human journey, or personal painful experiences in our own stories, we need to remember. These times when humanity in general or people in particular have lost their way are times that need to be reconciled and redeemed.

If we lose the memories, we will make the same mistakes again. The human soul needs a strong sense of affirmation, direction, and clear purpose. Without these essentials, we will easily run amuck and repeat the sins of our past. God's voice throughout history has spoken precisely about this! We are reminded through the voices and example of many prophets and witnesses not to make the same mistakes again, come back to center, discover the purpose given to us by God, maintain a sense of proper direction, seek healing for wounds and be reconciled to our Creator.

Baptism is so incredibly important for the salvation of humankind, not only eternally but here and now. Our existence depends upon it. It gives us the affirmation we need from God by gifting us with the same intimate relationship Jesus had with the Father. We are blessed with the direction and clear purpose we need in order to be productive stewards and faithful Christians. Baptism calls us to remember, accept, and deal with the sins and inequities of our past regardless of how hurtful and serious. We consciously choose to turn away from them and put on the new life of Christ. To do this well, we must look hard and long at our sins and failings, listen to what they are saying and learn from them. If we ignore the past, collectively or personally, or pretend that it never happened, we will never grow. We will surely die.

People need to hear the message, lived and spoken, delivered by the baptized members of the Body of Christ. It is an essential message of hope that is layered with visions of justice, peace, reconciliation, redemption, blessing, and healing. It is a message that helps us remember what has gone before, the graces and the sins, and bring ourselves by God's help where we need to be. We are called to do much more than sit home behind our closed doors. We have a message to deliver. Are we ready to do so?
