HOLY WEEK

Today is **Palm Sunday of Our Lord's Passion**, and we wave our palm branches in a spirit of joy and triumph. In Biblical times, the palm tree was considered a "kindly" tree because of its lofty height and majestic appearance. The palm tree became a symbol of royalty and victory. Today, we begin to recall Jesus' victory over sin and death. The victory was through Jesus' suffering and death.

We call this week Holy Week ...

The name, bestowed by our ancestors, should cause us to enter this week with reverence, embrace its demands with delight and celebrate its rites with all the care, devotion, and energy it deserves. To celebrate Holy Week is, after all, to celebrate who we have become through Christ's paschal mystery.

On Holy Thursday evening, we experience the washing of feet in tender humility. Jesus tells that we must serve each other in such humble and intimate ways as foot washing. Through what works of charity and justice do we wash the feet of the poor? What humble and intimate service do we offer to each other?

From Good Friday sunset until Holy Saturday sunset is the Paschal Sabbath, the day of rest. In burial, Jesus rested and we rest in Him. We keep watch, learning the lessons of restfulness, silence, and darkness. In the quiet of our hearts this day, we need to reflect upon the Cross of Christ. We are invited to be reconciled beneath the Cross.

Holy Saturday evening, we come together to keep the Night Watch of the Resurrection of the Lord. On this night, we witness resurrection. Life puts death to death. On this night, we witness resurrection in our midst as we welcome the Elect into full Communion at the Table of the Lord.

We invite you to join us in worship at all our Holy Week liturgies.

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

For the first time in two years, we begin our public celebration of Holy Week with the liturgy of Palm Sunday of our Lord's Passion. There were no Holy Week public liturgies last year due to the pandemic. Today we commemorate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, with the carrying of palms and the singing of anthems. Today's gospel focuses on the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord, not only in history, but in our midst as well.

The liturgies of Holy Week are designed to invite us into the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus, and will be much simpler in format than you will remember from previous years. But these liturgies should not be viewed as separate happenings, but a single continuous celebration of the sacred mysteries. Holy Thursday, we commemorate the institution of the sacraments of Holy Orders and Eucharist, with Jesus giving us the commandment that as He has done for us, we are to do for others. In loving service, we commit ourselves once again to the Eucharist that we receive and we are called to become. Though the washing of the feet is eliminated this year, that action and the institution of the Eucharist are inseparably linked, revealing the heart of God in our midst. The Evening Mass of the Lord's Last Supper will be celebrated Holy Thursday at 7:00

On Good Friday, we gather at 3:00 p.m. to celebrate the Good Friday Liturgy of the Lord's Passion. The red vestments worn this day serve as a reminder that deep love often requires the shedding of blood. This day's scriptures recall the role of the Suffering Servant of God, one who would suffer and offer His life for God's people. All sin and evil in the world are brought to the throne of the cross, as Jesus gives his life for the salvation of all people for all time. During Good Friday liturgy, all will be invited to venerate the cross, although due to safety protocols, we will not be inviting people to come forward as has been done in previous years. Through this veneration, we remember that it is through the sacrifice of Jesus on the wood of the cross that we have been made free. Today's liturgy concludes with the reception of the Eucharist. We depart in silence, symbolically remembering Jesus being placed in the tomb, as we wait for the Spirit to raise Jesus back to

Holy Saturday is spent in quiet preparation and anticipation as the Lord rests in the tomb, awaiting the resurrection. The Easter Vigil Liturgy begins at 7:00 p.m. on Holy Saturday evening. This "mother of all vigils" witnesses the Lord's resurrection, with the blessing of the Easter fire and the lighting of the Easter candle, as well as inspiring readings from scripture, recalling God's activity and work throughout human history. During the Easter Vigil liturgy, we will welcome those who have been preparing for the Easter sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. We will also renew our own baptismal promises during the Vigil. On Easter Sunday, we continue

EVERY DAY STEWARDSHIP

Holy Week is a week for being mindful. We must set loose the baggage of Lent, and not be deterred by the dazzling sunrise of Easter morning beckoning in the distance.

It's okay for us to be excited for Easter. We've waited so long, after all. In my opinion it's one of the best feelings there is: the yearning we have in our hearts for the Resurrection as we embark on Palm Sunday. And in a purely logical sense, many of us have Easter celebrations for which we are preparing, and practical considerations to contend with. It's going to be a busy week, one likely full of happy distractions.

But my friends, we simply must keep our feet on the ground. Let's not "skip" Holy Week. Resist the urge to flip to the last page of the book, to fast-forward to the final scene of the movie. Don't rob yourself of the journey. This week is a blessed opportunity. It is this week that teaches us who we are. In the span of the Triduum, we have the birthday of the priesthood, the institution of the Eucharist, the sacrifice on Calvary and so many other vivid and meaningful scenes.

It may sound strange, to advise someone to savor the moments of Holy Week. There are so many violent and heartrending moments, after all. But this is the valley of tears, remember — we are not in Heaven yet. And here, in our fallen, sin-filled world, it is the heartrending moments that seem to matter the most.

These are the moments that define us as Catholics. Live them. Cherish them. Be present for each one.
