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PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

The Memorial Day weekend has arrived! This weekend is more than just a three or four day holiday that marks the beginning of summer, and all the seasonal opportunities that the beginning of summer has to offer. It is a time for travel, family, friends, and enjoyable times. This weekend is also a time for us to reflect and remember the many women and men who have given the ultimate gift of their life for our freedom, our country, and its citizenry. Whenever we visit a cemetery (and I hope you will take the time to visit a cemetery this Memorial Day weekend), we often think of the massive loss of American lives that have been sacrificed for our country. President John F. Kennedy, (whose 104th birthday is May 29) once said that the value of society is not measured by what it has done, but by how it remembers. If America's sons and daughters are willing to march, fight, and die for their country, then the least we can do is to remember. And remember we do, each Memorial Day.

If anything positive resulted from the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, it has been an increased awareness of patriotism for our country and a deeper appreciation and respect for those who serve our country, risking their lives in protecting us and our way of life. Whether it is the spontaneous recognition in an airport given to troops arriving home from military deployment, or the more organized and public recognition offered by various groups and organizations to honor the military, each of these occasions are particularly touching and heartwarming. One incident I recall focused on a military honoree who was a staff sergeant, who had served one tour of duty in Iraq and two in Afghanistan. As the public address announcer read a statement summarizing the staff sergeant's military career, the spectators in the stadium, one by one, including players, coaches, umpires, broadcasters, media members, came to their feet and broke into thunderous applause. By the time the public address announcer announced his name, everyone was standing and applauding wildly, many with tears of appreciation in their eyes. True to form, the sergeant simply acknowledged this tribute with a grateful wave.

It has been said that heroes are those people who are willing to put their lives on the line for what they believe, be it principles, a family, a country, a world. A person does not have to die to be a hero, but death does seem to be the crown of heroism. Memorial Day does not glorify death, nor does it encourage sacrifice. But it is a call to remember those whom we promise to remember. This Memorial Day, I encourage you to take some time to remember. I hope you will offer a prayer to God to watch over and protect the women and men of today's military who are serving throughout the world. I hope you will ask God to embrace those who have made the ultimate sacrifice with peace and life in the Kingdom; those people we have promised never to forget. And I hope you will offer a prayer of gratitude for those people who serve

THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

Let God be who God is. This is often one of the hardest things to do. Rather than allowing the mystery of being created in the image and likeness of God unfold and take root in our lives, we change the dynamic. We want to be the creators who want to make God into the image and likeness we need God to be. We have a hard-enough time letting the people in our lives be who they are. We struggle even more so with God. It is almost as if we want God to be our imaginary friend who is not only with us whenever we need but becomes the Being we need God to be. Who is it that we want God to be today? A protector, disciplinarian, champion for justice, healer, advocate for our cause, grantor of prayers, guardian of my life, or the avenger? Our prayers tell an interesting story. When you pray, what does God look like?

Recently, a young woman who was feeling invisible, overlooked, ignored, and misunderstood by her husband struggled to make her feelings known and get his attention. Finally, she screamed, "Listen to me!" Thus, birth was given to a renewed and healthier relationship. We spend so much time storming heaven with our agenda and trying to make God into a "god" of our desires that we do not hear God saying, "Listen to me!" God is desperately trying to get our attention. God is saying, I am here among you as not one but three, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Many people seldom notice God's presence because they are so caught up with other spiritual cares and concerns. And, when the "god" they fashion and create doesn't produce as they desire, they shake the dust from their feet and move on. "I tried," they exclaim, "but God didn't listen."

Healthy relationships aren't built on making someone be who we need them to be. Healthy relationships are built on encounters of persons and the development of an appreciation of someone solely for who they are. Deeper relationships can even be found with two people marveling at each other and almost experiencing a childlike joy and giddiness when they see the other coming. Do you ever have these feelings about God? Believe it or not, God does for you! There is a joyful laughter that gives rise to and connects all three members of the Holy Trinity. It is this laughter, flowing from the very depths of the Godhead that not only keeps the Trinity in joyful unity but spills over into the creation of all beings and things. It is an expression of Divine Delight! Have you ever taken time away from your agenda to experience the Divine Joyfulness of God?

We can reach a connection of Presence wherein even the smallest of creatures suddenly radiate the fullness of God: the wonderful creation of their being, the innocence and playfulness of their movements, and the sustaining life breath that flows through their veins. The same God who created the heavens and the earth is the same God who wants you to call him 'Dad' and the same God who preserves your life and has all things in His care.

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
