

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

This coming week, St. Mary Our Mother School joins other Catholic schools throughout the nation in celebrating national Catholic Schools Week. REGIONAL EVENTS 2022 Diocesan Public Policy Weekend - 2/12 & 2/13 *Care for the Marginalized through an Equitable & Just NYS Budget*

Do you know that nearly 1 in 5 children ages 0-4 in New York live in poverty? Do you know that children ages 0-4 are not covered in the Empire State Child Credit? Modest increases in income to low-income families can yield tremendous benefits for children and their families, including improved physical, emotional and behavioral health, and higher educational achievement. The benefits are particularly significant, and most acutely needed, in families with young children. Families with young children face poverty at greater rates than other families. In fact, the birth of a child is the leading trigger of "poverty spells" experienced by families. In addition stress and hunger can impair brain development, which is most rapid when children are very young, and can lead to lifelong deficits. Strengthening family economic security improves the lives not only for the current generation of children, but the next, because poor children are much more likely to grow up to be poor adults.

The pandemic has been emotionally hard on all of us, unfortunately it has been harder on some than others. Did you know that overdose deaths have increased by 38%. Over 40% of people have reported mental health concerns. To make matters worse, as this need has spiked, providers have been unable to maintain the critical staff who can provide assistance. We are asking the Governor and New York State to invest in our behavioral health providers by including a long-delayed COLA increase and a \$500 million investment in workforce development, service, and support in the Executive Budget. We are hoping that this will permit service providers to continue this most vital service. Jesus preached the need to care for one another - we cannot leave people going untreated in their time of most need!

Our Diocesan Public Policy Committee is encouraging everyone to sign the petition calling for an Equitable and Just NYS Budget on **February 12th & 13th** - Diocesan Public Policy Advocacy Weekend. You can sign the petition online at <u>https://www.dor.org/</u> <u>petition/</u> or sign the copy that will be in our bulletin on February 5th and 6th. Bring it to Mass on February 12th or 13th. Thank you for caring about babies and toddlers and vulnerable people in need of mental health services.

DIOCESE OF ROCHESTER PERMANENT DIACONATE

The deacon is a man of faith, who is called from the community that already recognizes his dedication to service. He makes a lifetime commitment to serving the People of God by proclaiming the Word, assisting and presiding at liturgies, and minister in the areas of charity and social justice. A deacon gives witness to his availability to the community by addressing present and emerging needs of the Church.

The Diocese is inviting interested men of strong and active faith, who can demonstrate a record of service in the communities in which they live, work and worship, who may wish to explore a possible call to ordained ministry as a permanent deacon, to first speak with their pastor for an initial conversation. They may also contact Deacon Edward Giblin, Director of the Office of the Permanent Diaconate at Edward.giblin@dor.org for additional information. A potential candidate must be at least 35 years of age and no older than 62 years at the time of ordination after a five (5) year period of formation. He must be in good health, emotionally mature, have stable relationships and must have the wholehearted support of his wife (if married) and family to enter the phase of inquire. Because the parish is the primary experience of Church for most inquirers, the parish community is asked as well to invite from among its members men who exhibit strong faith and a spirit of service and encourage them to consider a possible vocation to a permanent diaconate.
