

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

The season of Lent is traditionally a time of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Christians from the earliest days of the Church have considered this period of time as a "Time of Enlightenment", a period of time to practice these three Lenten disciplines. But just what are these disciplines supposed to accomplish in us? To this day, it is common for people to tell us what they are doing for Lent, or what sacrifices people are making during the season of Lent, whether it is abstaining from dining in restaurants (which many of us have been doing since the start of the pandemic) or abstaining from television, candy, alcohol, You may also hear people mention spending less time with their ipods, smart phones and the internet. But what is the reasoning behind these sacrifices people make during Lent? What are these pentitential practices to accomplish?

The Lenten practices we embrace during this season are meant to change our hearts. We journey through this Lenten season together as a church, athough each of us has the freedom to choose our own Lenten practices. In changing individual hearts, we can change all hearts. The actions of any of us affect all of us, for good or ill. We involve ourselves in these Lenten practices to help not only ourselves but others in the discipline of Lent. We have an opportunity to grow closer to God and to change hearts. Lent is a season when we can remove anything that keeps us from being the person and the people of God wants us to be. Anything that keeps us from growing closer to God and to one another is something we can work on as a part of our Lenten disciplines and penance. The Lenten season is a time when our prayer can help change and transform our lives, in which our acts of penance can build up the community of faith.

The "official" fast days during the season of Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, but your personal fasting need not be restricted just to those two days of Lent. Personal fasting can be done at any time. Once again this year, our parish will be participating in Operation Rice Bowl, with all monies collected from these rice bowls being forwarded to Catholic Relief Services. This is an excellent practice in offering alms for the sake of others, and reminds us of the needs of the hungry throughout the world. On a local level, you may want to include a local charitable organization to be the recipient of your Lenten almsgiving. For those who have not yet given to the Catholic Ministries Appeal, you may want to make a gift to this annual appeal, and help our parish to reach our goal.

Whatever disciplines you choose in Lent this year, know that it is focused on healing to bring about a change of heart in each of us. I invite you, during the Lenten season, to pray, to fast, and to be generous in the giving of alms. Even during these days where we continue to battle the coronavirus together, we also make our Lenten journey together, celebrating this season as a season of growth and renewal.

An Invitation to Journey Through Lent with Catholic Relief Services Rice Bowl

The Pillars of Lent: Prayer, Fasting, Almsgiving

As we begin our Lenten journey, we reflect on how our prayers, fasting, and almsgiving can guide us. Pope Francis explains, these are "elements which, when lived sincerely, can transform life and provide a sure foundation for dignity and fraternity." Our sacrifices during this holy season have the power to change lives deepening our faith and our connection to our one human family.

SAINTS

St. Catherine of Bologna - March 9th, came from an upper-class family in Ferrara, a city in Italy, and received an education at the court, where she learned reading, writing, singing and drawing. But despite her advantages, her heart yearned for God.

She joined a group of religious women in Ferrara at the age of 18. Four years later, that same group joined the Poor Clares, an order founded by St. Francis and St. Clare of Assisi. In 1456, she and 15 other sisters were sent to establish a Poor Clare monastery in Florence.

As abbess, St. Catherine of Bologna worked to establish the new community and maintain a semblance of peace throughout. She was a model of piety and reported experiencing miracles and several visions of Christ, and the Virgin Mary.

In 1463, St. Catherine of Bologna became seriously ill, and she passed away. She was buried without a coffin and her body was exhumed 18 days later because of many cures attributed to her at her graveside and the sweet scent coming from her grave. Her body was discovered incorrupt (meaning it was not decaying) and remains so today.

May the healing and peace of the Holy Spirit flow in the hearts of all, especially those who are bent on war.



DIOCESE OF ROCHESTER PERMANENT DIACONATE

The deacon is a man of faith, who is called from the community that already recognizes his dedication to service. He makes a lifetime commitment to serving the People of God by proclaiming the Word, assisting and presiding at liturgies, and minister in the areas of charity and social justice. A deacon gives witness to his availability to the community by addressing present and emerging needs of the Church.

The diocese is inviting interested men of strong and active faith, who can demonstrate a record of service in the communities in which they live, work and worship, who may wish to explore a possible call to ordained ministry as a permanent deacon, to first speak with their pastor for an initial conversation. They may also contact Deacon Edward Giblin, Director of the Office of the Permanent Diaconate at Edward.giblin@dor.org for additional information. A potential candidate must be at least 35 years of age and no older than 62 years at the time of ordination after a five (5) year period of formation. He must be in good health, emotionally mature, have stable relationships and must have the wholehearted support of his wife (if married) and family to enter the phase of inquire. Because the parish is the primary experience of Church for most inquirers, the parish community is asked as well to invite from among its members men who exhibit strong faith and a spirit of service and encourage them to consider a possible vocation to a permanent diac-
