PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

Another Labor Day is upon us! For many, this weekend signals the end of the summer activities. With schools opening this week, many summer vacations are winding down, and after a very warm, humid, and dry summer, it is time to savor the Labor Day weekend. Many families and groups of friends have Labor Day gatherings as a signal that another summer season is ending. With this in mind, we need to stop and appreciate the meaning of this event.

Of all the national holidays we have, Labor Day doesn't seem to get much attention. One reason might be is that we haven't found a way to commercialize the holiday as we have with Christmas, Valentine's Day, Easter, Mother's Day, Thanksgiving, and the like. Another reason is that the original intent of this day has pretty much vanished since labor unions have become a part of the American business environment. It is important to remember that unions were the early voice of the ordinary worker, advocating for the dignity and rights of the worker.

The efforts of labor unions in the past to protect the well-being of "voiceless workers" have resulted in the passage of legislation which now protects the rights and safety of many workers. However, there are still many people both near and far, who fall into the category of the "voiceless worker." I'm referring to the seasonal workers who help with the harvesting of our crops in our upstate New York area. These workers play an important role in our local economy.

I also think about the talented, immigrants who cannot find work because prejudice stands in the way; or the textile workers of the world who help make the clothes you and I wear, the farm worker who plays an important role in helping us enjoy our morning cup of coffee or tea, whose wages are so unjust they are hardly able to provide the basic necessities of life for themselves and their families. There is also those who are part of the work force throughout the world, including children, who perform their duties in extremely unsafe conditions. Who is there for them when it comes to just wages, a safe working environment, and basic human dignity?

On this Labor Day, please take a few moments to reflect on the work of others which supports the life you have become accustomed. Pause to give thanks to God for this huge network of people. From the farm and plantation workers who provide food for our tables; for clothing workers around the world who make the clothes we wear; for health care professionals who help enhance the beauty that surrounds us. REVIVAL IS IN THE AIR "GET OUT!!!



Have you ever visited family or friends and reached a point when you knew it was time to leave? It is not that you have overstayed your welcome, but simply that the hour has become late, vacation has come to an end, or your visit has reached its natural conclusion. We might imagine our host saying, "Get out! I need to get to bed!" or you might find yourself saying, "I really have to get going." At the end of Mass, we are told to get out. Not that

At the end of Mass, we are told to get out. Not that our host, the Lord himself, is tired of us and wants us out of his house, but rather, that the natural conclusion to our participation in the Eucharist is to be sent out in mission. We are to go out, "glorifying the Lord" by our lives. In the eucharist, we receive the Lord, are formed and nourished and made ready to live as followers of Jesus Christ in the course of our daily lives. When we think about it in this way, being sent out is part of the purpose in our coming to Mass in the first place.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENT:

"It's not that I want you to do it. It's that I want you to *want* to do it."

I f you're married or in a relationship, your partner has probably either said something like this to you or you have said it to them. If one of you hasn't said it, you have probably wanted to, and it's likely that a big argument or two was had where you dance around the sentiment, these exact words flashing in your mind like an old-time movie marquee.

The "it" never really matters much. Taking out the trash, painting the bedroom, traveling to your in-laws' for Christmas — whatever the subject matter of the disagreement is, it's all just so much set dressing. The heart of the matter is the sacrifice and desire. That's what it all hangs on. *Am I with a person who will sacrifice for me*?

When Paul writes to Philemon that he is sending Onesimus to him, he says exactly this. He tells Philemon that he would prefer to keep Onesimus with him, but that he does not want to deprive Philemon both of Onesimus and the opportunity to make a sacrifice worthy in the sight of the Lord.

The point is not who gets to hang out with Onesimus. The point is, as it says in the Gospel, who is willing to carry his cross? Who is willing to renounce his possessions? Who is willing to do the good deed for the sake of the other?

God doesn't care that much about what we have to offer. He cares much more that we have the strength to offer whatever we have. —*Tracy Earl Welliver*
