SAINT FRANCIS: a Stewardship Saint for Our Time

Scientists say that most of us will never experience the full wonder of the star-filled nighttime sky because of the "light pollution" which keeps our modern world too bright to see true night. No doubt, this would have saddened St. Francis of Assisi, whose feast we celebrate October 4th.

The saint who embraced the glory of creation, Francis is the patron saint of ecology and model steward for our present age. Always one of our most popular saints, you need only visit a garden shop to find that, even in the midst of secular commerce, you can find a lawn statue of the 12th century native of an Umbrian hill town. Yet like many famous folk, Francis has become somewhat stereotyped, those statues always adorned sweetly with little birds.

In reality, Francis was a bold and inspired man, a good steward of creation, who embraced it as bountifully good, emphasizing the original outpouring of God's love into the world (at a time when the emphasis was often placed heavily on the stain of original sin.) Francis was a good steward of his neighbor. He famously embraced a leper he met on the roadway, even though he deeply feared the disease. When the man appeared to vanish, Francis felt he had encountered Christ himself which

A STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

If we want to know what Jesus' parable is about in today's Gospel, it seems that we don't need to work too hard because Saint Luke tells us right at the beginning: "Jesus told His disciples a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart." This parable has often been used to bring comfort to us about our prayer life. But could there be a more challenging message for those who take stewardship seriously? Widows were the poorest and most vulnerable of people in Jesus' time. Oppressive legal and economic structures were the norm. Jesus embraced with great compassion the poor and the marginalized. Could it be that we are also encouraged to pray persistently for the poor, the weak and the vulnerable as we hear their cry for justice? And that we must not lose heart that we can effect change in their lives?

St. Francis continued:

strengthened his belief that God is found in all of creation

October offers Christian stewards an opportunity to pray outdoors in the beauty of autumn, the changing leaves, the early dusk. Be a good steward of your prayer life: Take a prayer walk, as St. Francis would. Ask the saints to help you recommit to a simpler lifestyle, recycling, reusing,, honoring resources, to seeing the earth and its poor as holy. Perhaps we might even venture out to the garden late at night, to see as many stars as we can.

:PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Due to an early bulletin deadline for this bulletin, I am writing this column on Tuesday, October 4th, in anticipation of the Columbus Day holiday weekend. We also are anticipating the first update of our support of the Catholic Ministries Appeal.

One of the most frequently asked questions concerning the Catholic Ministries Appeal is how the monies raised by the appeal are allocated. The following is a list of the Catholic Ministries Appeal allocations:

10% Serving people through Catholic Charities:

The CMA provides a subsidy to Catholic Charities to support its regional offices/agencies throughout 12 counties serving the poor, elderly, infirm, and the most vulnerable in our communities.

35% Providing diocesan-wide services to our parishes and institutions:

The CMA provides funding and resources to assist parishes, pastors, staff, Pastoral Councils, Finance Councils, ministers and chaplains in serving the faithful through Liturgical, Urban, Rural, and Multicultural programs and ministries; Hospitals and Jail Chaplaincy; Finance, Human Resources, Building/Property Management, Information Technology, Tribunal, Archives, Communications, Stewardship and Pastoral Planning Services.

7% Supporting Seminarians, Deacons, and Pastoral Leaders:

Your donations to the CMA support the education and professional development of our seminarians, deacons, and pastoral leaders.

4% Educating our Youth in the Catholic Faith: The CMA helps prepare our youth for fulfilling and faith-centered lives through parish religious education programs, Catholic schools, Campus Ministry, sacramental preparation, young adult and youth ministry programs.

29% Funding Operations and Support Services: The CMA helps to fund operation of all diocesan offices/ ministries in the Pastoral Center, including maintenance and capital improvements.

10% Funding the Ministries of our Pope and Bishop: The CMA gives Catholics the opportunity to extend their reach beyond their parish boundaries to support Vatican ministries, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, New York State Catholic Conference, the work and efforts of Bishop Matano and the lay advisory councils that guide diocesan-wide decisions.

CIVILIZE IT: A Better Kind of Politics...Elections 2022 and Beyond (Part 4)

"We must commit to approaching others with love", teaches Pope Francis in his encyclical, Fratelli Tutti. Even those with whom we disagree are children of God. Sadly, such an approach has become countercultural. We have become used to efforts aimed more to "discredit and insult opponents than to open a respectful dialogue aimed at achieving agreement on a deeper level." (FT #201) This is a situation in which we must be prophetic, modeling by example a respectful approach that honors others as made in God's image.....stepping outside ourselves, listening with empathy, and seeking to truly understand another person's experience.

REFLECT: How might I understand another's perspective while rooting my own perspectives in Catholic social teaching principles of love for others, common good, option for the poor and vulnerable, and dignity of the human person?
