

# **LESSONS AND CAROLS IS BACK!**



The 31st annual Service of Lessons and Carols will be held at the First United Methodist Church of Horseheads, on December 4th, at 5:00 p.m. The church is located at 1034 West Broad Street. The choirs of St. Mary Our Mother and First United Methodist Church of Horseheads and friends, will be joining together to present a wonderful evening of song, carols and readings. This service is guaranteed to put your heart and soul in the right place for Christmas. Mark your calendars and plan to spend an hour reveling in the joy of the Advent-Christmas season.



#### **PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:**

Today, we celebrate the Solemnity of **Christ the King**. This feast was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925, and celebrates an aspect of Jesus' identity rather than an event in His life, and is thus categorized among the "idea feasts." Another example of an "idea feast" would be that of the Holy Family. This feast was originally celebrated each year on the last Sunday in October, but with the revision of the Roman Missal after the Second Vatican Council, this feast was moved to the final Sunday of the liturgical year. By instituting the feast of Christ the King, Pope Pius XI hoped to renew and strengthen the faith of the people of his time. It was Pius XI's hope that this annual celebration would serve as a powerful sign of Jesus' reign in our midst, that its celebration would speak powerfully of our belief in God's triumph over evil. Christ our King continues to empower us to be His living presence in today's world.

Thursday of this week we celebrate the American feast of **Thanksgiving**. It is an annual event that invites us to go back into our history. We may think of the traditional story of the pilgrims and the Native Americans sitting down to a meal of turkey, corn on the cob, potatoes, squash and wonderful pies. We may think of the excited dreams that our colonial forefathers had as they ended their first year in this new land; the opportunities that they saw opening up for them, and how they rejoiced in the opportunity to make dreams come true. We may think of our more recent history and what it is for which we need to thank God. We may revisit Thanksgivings past and those who sat at table with us and now sit at God's table. We may simply look around our family table at home and see familiar faces and hear familiar stories and simply be grateful that we are a part of it all. Wherever our mindset might be, Thanksgiving gives us a moment to pause and not achieve anything but to simply be grateful for who we are.

Some years ago, I remember attending a kindergarten Thanksgiving Dinner. When I asked the children what the pilgrims ate on Thanksgiving, they, of course, responded "Turkey!" Then a little boy put his hand up and said "They had popsicles!" I smiled and asked the child "Why do you think they had popsicles?" He responded, "My teacher said that the pilgrims and Native Americans had their favorite foods—popsicles are my favorite food, so they must have had popsicles!" I told him that I didn't know if they had popsicles or not, but his logic was flawless! We then gathered in this huge circle and we were asked to name what we were thankful for. The usual answers were spoken: "Mom and Dad; Grandma and Grandpa; my sister; my brother; and the pet dog." Then I heard a little voice which said "I thank God that my Mommy is still alive!" A profound silence filled the room. I knew that this child's mother had been battling cancer and the tiny voice of a child spoke volumes of what was in her heart-it was a true prayer of thanks.

CHRISTMAS CARING PROGRAM

Over the years, St. Mary Our Mother parish has reached out to help the needy of Horseheads and its many surrounding rural areas. We have done this in partnership with the Horseheads Food Pantry, which serves these fami-lies by providing food assistance. Parishioners have generously been supporting the pantry year-long by donating grocery items to the vestibule food cart and clean, empty deposit bottles and cans to the parish office. Furthermore, 25% of the Rice Bowl proceeds that are returned by CRS are then given to help with the expenses of our local pantry.

As the Christmas season of giving and caring approaches, we, at St. Mary Our Mother, will be reaching out to the clients of the Food Pantry in three special ways.

- Making a monetary donation so the pantry can supply meat and fresh food for the Christmas meal and the holiday week. Envelopes will be provided for this purpose.
- Increasing our donations of canned and dried food to the vestibule food cart so the pantry clients have healthy and adequate food for the Christmas holidays.
- Bringing a Christmas ornament that you offer to a needy family. You will hang the ornament on our Christmas Caring Tree in the back of the church. The ornaments will be taken to the pantry so the families and children can pick an ornament for their tree as a reminder that we care for them.

This program will kick off on the weekend of November 19-20, when donation envelopes will be available in the vestibule and the Christmas Caring Tree will be standing proudly in the back of the church awaiting your ornaments. The program will conclude the weekend of December 10/11th.

The Social Ministry Committee invites and encourages all parishioners to participate in our Christmas Caring Program, in any one or more of the three ways listed above. Please be involved in spreading joy and showing love and concern for our neighbors in need.



#### SAINT CECILIA, NOVEMBER 22:

Saint Cecilia's story, like many of the earliest saints', is largely apocryphal and legendary in nature. According to tradition, Cecilia was born to a wealthy and prominent Roman family. Though she had consecrated her virginity to the Lord, she was married to a man named Valerian. It is said that she was "singing in her heart to the Lord" at her wedding. She confessed her promise of virginity to her new husband revealing that an angel protected her.

Valerian would honor her vow only if he too could see the angel. Cecilia told him he would see the angel if he was baptized, which he went to do immediately. When he returned to her, he saw the angel beside her. Cecilia also converted Valerian's brother, Tiburtius.

Unfortunately, it was a turbulent time in Rome for Christians. Valerian and Tiburtius were martyred for burying the bodies of Christians, which was illegal. Cecilia was also targeted for her faith. First authorities attempted to suffocate her by locking her in the bath in her home and overheating the room. Some accounts say that she didn't break a sweat and even began to sing. They then sent in an executioner to behead her, but he faltered and was unable to complete his task, only succeeding in mortally wound-

ing her. She remained alive for three days before she died.

The saint's body was exhumed twice, first by Pope Paschal I in 821, then by Cardinal Sfondrato in 1599. Both times her body was found incorrupt, the first saint to exhibit this extremity. St. Cecilia is the patron saint of music and musicians.
