

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

We arrive today at the **Fourth Sunday of Advent.** We begin the final week of this joyous and hope filled season. We also see somewhat of a shift of emphasis from the prophetic writings and people like John the Baptist who announced the coming of the Lord, to how God accomplishes His plan of salvation through the life of Mary, the Mother of God, but of so many others who are open to God's call and obedient to his word.

I recently came across this reflection which emphasizes the openness to God's call through the lives of two important people of this Advent season—Mary, and Elizabeth, the mother of John the Baptist. These are wonderful words to ponder as we journey through these final days of Advent.

FORTH SUNDAY IN ADVENT—GOSPEL REFLECTION:

"Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."– Luke 1: 45

In the first reading this Sunday, the Prophet Micah proclaims, "You, Bethlehem-Ephrathah, too small to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me, one who is to be ruler in Israel, His greatness shall reach to the ends of the earth; He shall be peace."

In the Gospel, we hear of the interaction between two women who miraculously find themselves with child— Elizabeth, who was advanced in years and Mary, who was unwed. They marvel at God's work in their lives.

In reading their story, we can also marvel at the humble way God chose to come into our world. It speaks to one of the deepest truths of the Christian faith: that God values and lifts that which the world considered worthless, sees those who are obscure, empowers those who are powerless. *Continued on page 4*

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS:

St. Joseph the Steward

St. Joseph is one of the greatest examples of stewardship we have in the Gospels. Here is a man who understands care and reverence for the property of God, a man chosen to be steward over the very life and breath of God's Son and Spouse.

Joseph was mindful. He recognized what belonged to God. When he understood that Mary was to be the mother of God, he was not jealous or bitter. He did not presume to claim ownership over her.

Joseph was prayerful. He accepted the opportunity to be in relationship with God, even if it was in a radical and unexpected way. How many of us would trust a crazy dream we have where an angel tells us our fiancée she is carrying the Son of God? Well, those of us who are already profoundly connected to God through prayer. Joseph was open to receiving God, and so he was open to the truth in a way many of us would not have been.

Joseph was gracious. Even before he had full understanding of the situation, he was unwilling to expose Mary to shame. He did not give himself over to feelings of betrayal.

Joseph was committed. He persevered. The Lord had no shortage of strange and even dangerous-sounding tasks for Joseph, but he submitted to each one.

Joseph was accountable. When he awoke from his dream, "he did as the angel of the Lord had commanded him, and took his wife into his home."

Joseph was a man entrusted with many gifts, and he gave of them wisely. Let us pray that we have the grace to follow in his example. ©LP

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REFLECTION ON OUR ADVENT TRIVIA OUIZ:

1. Which of these events does Advent NOT anticipate?. Answer-the Resurrection

The term "Advent" comes from the Latin "adventus", which means coming or arrival. In liturgical Christianity, it is a season of anticipation as Christians await three types of comings or arrivals: the physical birth of Christ (Nativity), the believers reception of Christ into his or her heart, and the second coming of Christ.

2. How many purple candles will you typically find in the Advent wreath? Answer: three (3)

According to Teddy Colbert, the author of the book "The Living Wreath", the tradition of the advent wreath originated among German Lutherans in the 16th century. It is Three of the candles are purple, and one is rose colored.

3. What is the last day of Advent? Answer: Christmas Eve

Although the start date of Advent varies from year to year (depending on which day is the fourth Sunday before Christmas) Advent always ends on Christmas Eve. The Christmas season begins on December 25, and the twelve days of Christmas last until Epiphany on January 6.

4. The liturgical church year begins with Advent.

In the liturgical church calendar, the first Sunday in Advent marks the beginning of the Christian new year. The Advent season is followed by the Christmas season (also called Christmastide), Ordinary time (or the time after Epiphany), Lent, Easter, and the longer period of Ordinary Time (or the time after Pentecost).
