CARING FOR GOD'S CREATION: Fourth Sunday of Easter

"Practice observing and appreciating the beauty in all aspects of creation that surround you. A STEWARDSHIP MOMENT: Third Sunday of Easter:

As today's gospel reveals, the first meal shared with the risen Lord happened in a place called Emmaus. Perhaps there is no better time to reflect on this story than in those prayerful moments at Mass when we return to our place after receiving Holy Communion. Those few moments give us an opportunity to reflect on our stewardship of Christ's presence within us. We have a chance to practice hospitality by inviting Jesus into our hearts to walk and talk with us about our own Emmaus journey. We can relive once again the time when He broke bread for the disciples. And just as they did, we too can recognize Christ in this meal we have just shared with others.



PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

One of the edifying sights that I have observed are the number of families who are bringing their "little ones" to church on weekends. After all, we often refer to ourselves as a church family, and families have children. Children by their nature are still learning about the times to use their "inside voices" and behaviors. There are times when they need to run around and just be kids. I believe it is very important for families to bring their children to church so that this becomes an important part of their normal life. So parents, continue to bring your children to church. You need not worry about them distracting others, or drowning out the homilists! Most of us have big voices, not to mention amplification systems!

However, if your attempts to settle your little one are unsuccessful, just take them for a short walk to the narthex or vestibule. And for our more "seasoned" members, thank you for your patience and understanding. No one ever knows what another person is going through—health challenges, life struggles or personal crises. Each of us needs to be compassionate, patient, and understanding.

The following is an article which started my thought process on this topic. The author is unknown, but his message is spot on.

There you are sitting at Mass. Your child, or toddler, is restless. Perhaps they are even a little boisterous. You try to silence them, and nothing. You try to pacify them with food or toys, and nothing. Eventually, you resort to the last thing you wanted to do: you pick them up, and before a watching audience, you make the march out of the church. All the while, you're a little embarrassed. Maybe you're a little frustrated too. You might even think to yourself, "There is no point in coming to church; I get nothing out of it because I have to constantly care for my kid."

I want you—you mothers and fathers—to know just how encouraging you are to so many. The little elderly woman who often feels alone beams with a smile at the sight of you wrestling with your little one. She's been there before. She knows how hard it can be, but she smiles because, to hear that, brings back precious memories. To see young parents and their children brightens her day, and she may have just received bad news this week about her health, but seeing the vitality of young ones removes—if but for a moment her fears.

The older man who always seems to be grouchy notices you too. He's always talking about how children in this day have no respect or sense of the common good. But he sees you—a young family—in church, and you don't miss any gathering. Like clockwork, he can depend on the sight of you and your young family. You give him hope that maybe the church isn't doomed after all, because there are still young parents who love God enough to bring their restless children to worship.

Bring your children to church. If you don't hear crying, the church is dying. As hard as it might be for you as a parent who's half-asleep and dead tired, keep on doing

MASS OF RECOGNITION OF THE SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY






2023 Gala: Flappers and Fellas:
