

LIVING STEWARDSHIP:

The 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time provides profound insights into the essential aspects of living the stewardship way of life on our Christian journey.

In the first reading from Exodus, we witness the encounter between God and His chosen people at Mount Sinai. The Lord, through Moses, reminds the Israelites of His faithfulness and the covenant He has established with them. This reading reminds us of our vocation as stewards and disciples. They invite us to embrace the call to stewardship by recognizing our responsibility to care for God's creation and to share our gifts with others generously.

In our second reading from Romans, St. Paul beautifully articulates God's love for humanity. He reminds us that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us, reconciling us with God and offering us the gift of salvation. As stewards, we are to gratefully recognize God's abundant love and respond by using our gifts and resources to build His kingdom. In our stewardship and discipleship, we discover the joy of participating in God's redemptive work, bringing hope and healing to a broken world.

Living Stewardship continued:

The Gospel reading from Matthew recounts how Jesus is moved with compassion as He sees the crowds who are like sheep without a shepherd. He commissions His disciples, empowering them to continue His healing mission and preach the Kingdom of God. Like the Good Shepherd, we are to have hearts filled with empathy and concern for those who are lost, suffering, or in need.

Stewardship challenges us to extend a helping hand, offer comfort, and meet our brothers and sisters physical, emotional, and spiritual needs in Christ. Living a life of stewardship and discipleship challenges us to move beyond our comfort zones, embracing the call to serve and witness the transformative power of Christ's love. To do so requires a willingness to step out in faith, be empowered by the Holy Spirit, and be instruments of God's grace and healing. As you go, make this proclamation: "The Kingdom of Heaven is at hand." (Matthew 10:7).

Many of us take our lives for granted. We think we have plenty of time to "repent." Maybe we should live with a little more urgency in making things right with God. This is the difference in living our discipleship out of obligation versus out of love. Obligation implies we do the minimum required. Love implies we want a relationship. God wants us to be with Him in Heaven forever, but He also wants us to live stewardship and to be in relationship with us right now, while we are on earth. Start this second – invite the Lord into your whole life, and give your all to Him.



PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

Congratulations and best wishes to all our fathers on this Fathers Day! Our country feels that the role of a parent is so important that each year it designates a day in May for mothers and a day in June for fathers. As we mature, we tend to reflect more about how we have become the person we are today, and we discover that we have adopted many of our traits from our parents. There is a time in our formative years when we view ourselves as completely independent, that all growth and maturation is completely independent from the people and the world around us. Gradually, we discover that many of our personality traits can be clearly identified with our parents. Fathers Day is a day to be grateful and appreciative of life itself, the nurturing our fathers have given us, and to actually say a word of thanks for all our fathers have given us.

It is also a day to appreciate God the Father in our lives. Care for God's Creation—Plastic/Packaging Waste Reduction Legislation in New York State:

BACKGROUND: The New York State Legislature is considering legislation to reduce plastic waste by 50% over twelve years. The Packaging Reduction and Recycling Infrastructure Act (A.5322 S.4246) would require companies selling, offering for sale, or distributing, cover packaging materials and products, to reduce consumer packaging, improve recycling and recycling infrastructure, including supporting reusable and refill infrastructure, financially support municipal recycling programs, reduce toxins in packaging and require producers of products to bear the responsibility for end of life solutions to product packaging. Pope Francis mentions this idea of circular production where resources are reused/repurposed rather than simply discarded (Laudato Si).

Discarded plastic and other packaging is clogging landfills and no one knows how much plastic and other packaging waste ends up in the oceans threatening ocean ecosystems. If plastic had been invented when the Pilgrims sailed from England, and the Mayflower had been stocked with plastic wrapped snacks etc., their plastic trash would likely still be around now, four centuries later.

ACTION NEEDED: Please encourage our NYS Legislators to pass this bill before they adjourn for the summer. Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie and Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins are supporting passage. Mass Question:

I've noticed that when I go to Mass at different parishes, sometimes people say and do different things. Why is that?

Answer:

The Mass in its current form has taken shape over the course of 2,000 years. Over time, traditions, structures, and prayers have been put into place. There are certain rubrics for the Mass that are normative wherever you go. This means you could attend Mass in Malawi or Thailand or Italy and still watch the same basic liturgy unfold, even if you don't understand the language. There may be some cultural differences from place to place, things that aren't specifically listed. For example, in the United States most people go up for Communion in a nice neat line. In Europe, everyone gets up around the same time. It's a bit of a free-for-all!

Some people might take it upon themselves to change things individually. People may not like something that feels too "liberal" or "conservative," and they may take a well-meaning stance in the opposite direction. When people (including the presiders) do things that are distracting or change the liturgy, it introduces an element that breaks the unity of the assembled community. The important thing to remember is that we gather as the Body of Christ to celebrate the Eucharist. If you are confused, ask! If you are frustrated, pray for the spirit of charity.

ON THE LIGHTER SIDE


