

A STEWARDSHIP MOMENT: 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time:

The Prayers God Will Always Answers

When I was a child, my mother bought a book called "The Prayers God Will Always Answer." I remember my anticipation as I cracked the spine and turned to the first page.

I had been spending much time asking God — begging God — over and over again for some specific things that were not materializing. Frankly, it was beginning to feel a lot like that time I asked Santa Claus for a new house, only to wake up on Christmas morning to find ordinary, nonhouse-shaped presents under the tree — and a growing sense of suspicion that my faith had been ill-placed.

To the great disappointment of my pre-teen heart, my mother's book was not a directory of magical phrases God is compelled to obey. It was a list that included things like "Forgive me" and "Help me." I tossed it aside, disappointed.

I marvel at the wisdom and the confidence of the Canaanite woman who persists in begging Jesus to heal her daughter. She is ignored, and still, she will not be deterred. The disciples try to dismiss her — still, she presses on. Christ himself challenges her, and her faith makes her ready with a reply.

Somehow, I am sure that even if Christ had said, "No, it cannot be done for you as you wish," she would have still dropped to her knees and worshiped Him because she knew what I did not: God is not a vending machine, and He's not the genie from "Aladdin." Prayer is not a negotiation, but a relationship.

The Canaanite woman's story is not about how to get God to give you what you want. It is a story about the prayers God always answers.

"Then Jesus said to her in reply, 'O woman, great is your faith!" — Matthew 15:28



PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

The following article was printed in the July 2023 newsletter published by the International Catholic Stewardship Conference. It is the first of a four-part series by the Reverend Joseph D. Creedon from his 2018 book, *Stewardship*: A Life-Giving Spirituality.

Baptism makes us disciples with a mission and a ministry; Confirmation seals us with the seven-fold gifts of the Holy Spirit. Eucharist feeds our body, mind, and spirit to help us live our faith to its fullness. We eat the bread and drink the wine to make sure that we do not forget the love that motivated Jesus to suffer and die for us; to make sure that we never forget that His love was rewarded when His father called Him back to life and changed human history forever! Eucharist is the Stewardship sacrament par excellence.

Without grateful hearts Eucharist can never be fully experienced. As all of us are painfully aware, attendance at Mass is at an all-time low. The explanations for the decline in Mass attendance are many, and it is doubtful that any one explanation can explain fully why participation in the Eucharist on Sunday fails to motivate so many people.

There are some who believe that when the liturgy was no longer celebrated in Latin that we lost our sense of mystery. Once the mystery was gone, people began to drift away. While it cannot be disputed that the beginning of the drop in attendance at Sunday Mass began about the time that English was introduced, most would agree that the relationship is coincidental rather than casual.

Others believe that the drop in Mass attendance is the result of secularism. When I was a young boy all of Sunday, but especially Sunday morning, was reserved for Church. There was no shopping because all of the shops were closed. There were no Sunday morning road races, no soccer matches, and no football games. Sunday morning was for Church. Obviously, this is no longer the case. For too many people Sunday is the only day they do not work. Sunday is now seen as personal time for those who work too long and too hard. Religion now has to compete with an ever-increasing number of opportunities on Sunday, and we are not winning the battle.

Some people were driven away from Church as a reaction to the sexual abuse scandal that is ongoing in our Church. Some think that as believers are better educated, their need for church wanes. Still others insist that the new English translation of the Mass, which is certainly new but certainly not English, has added to the problem of declining participation in Sunday Mass. In addition to all these contributing factors is the reality that more and more people do not believe that missing Mass on Sunday is a sin. (Continued in next column)


