

A GOSPEL MEDITATION:

Isn't it easy to relate to Peter? One moment Jesus announces Peter's deep communion with God the Father. The very next, when he rejects the logic of Jesus' suffering and death, Jesus calls Peter Satan. We Christians shouldn't be too shocked when we experience both spiritual highs and lows when we perceive breathtaking contradictions in our hearts.

Like the great apostle, you and I are recipients of unfathomable graces. God dwells in us, calls us His beloved children, and takes care of our every need. And we also continually fail to embrace our sufferings with trust in Jesus. We know the truth of the creed, but we easily scorn the weight of the cross.

The good news is that, like Peter, we are never abandoned by the Lord even at our worst moments. Peter will eventually learn the beauty of the cross when he is willingly crucified. But it took time for him to get there. And it takes time for us, too. This week let's not be too shocked at these divisions in our hearts, but accept them and patiently seek to be more obedient to Jesus' cross shaped plan for us.

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

Another Labor Day weekend is upon us! For many this weekend signals the end of summer activities. With schools opening this week, summer vacations are winding down, and with autumn just around the corner, it is time to savor the Labor Day weekend. Many families and groups of friends will gather this weekend to enjoy this final holiday of the summer season. With this in mind, it is important to pause and appreciate the meaning of this holiday.

The question has been often asked "When did Labor Day become a holiday?" In 1894, President Grover Cleveland declared Labor Day a legal holiday, a time for people of this nation to pay tribute to the American worker. Three years earlier, Pope Leo XIII had published a landmark encyclical entitled Rerum Novarum, which championed the rights and dignities of workers. Leo XIII insisted that all workers had the right to productive work, just wages, and benefits. To achieve these goals, workers also have the right to organize or to join a union.

On this Labor Day, Americans have much to be grateful for. Even in these challenging economic times, we enjoy economic freedom. The prosperity we enjoy in this country is not something that is common in every country throughout the world. Many people have been left behind and the gap in family income continues to widen. The top five percent of the American population takes home a larger share in personal income today than it did forty years ago. At the same time, the shares of income going to people in the middle sixty percent has declined by nearly ten percent. This decline is even sharper for those in the bottom twenty percent. This trend is one reason for America to respect a strong, active, and democratic labor movement.

Workers, particularly members of organized labor, have given much to America over the last century. It is through their efforts that the great American middle-class was born. Yet, American unions never capitalized to the concept or "class" warfare that found such fertile ground in the rest of the industrialized world. Union leaders instead saw their organization as part of the American experience of democracy and urged their membership to seek social justice for all, instead of class struggle.

Many of the values embedded in the labor movement's search for social justice have a firm foundation in our own faith values. Both seek public policies that protect and promote strong families and family values, expand a stable middle-class, create decent jobs, and reduce the level of poverty and need in our society. In another encyclical on labor and the dignity of workers, *Laborum Exercens*, the late **Pope John Paul II** envisioned a society in which the singular title of "worker," would be applied to all, whether the worker be a doctor, a mechanic, or a CEO. Work, the late Holy Father wrote,

U.S. FARM BILL 2023

Every five years the US Congress authorizes the national farm bill that funds a variety of domestic and international food and agricultural programs for the next five years. Most of the Farm Bill funding covers programs in the U.S. (like crop insurance, forestry and conservation, rural development, SNAP etc.). A small amount funds international food and development assistance such as the Food for Peace, Food for Progress, McGovern-Dole Food for Education, and the Farmer-to-farmer programs. No legislation has more impact than a farm bill on the U.S. food system, and the nation's ability to provide healthy food at affordable prices to everyone. The SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) is the nation's first line of defense against hunger, helping income-eligible individuals and families purchase the food they need for a healthy life. According to U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, in New Your States. 54% of those helped by SNAP are families with children; 48% are older adults or disabled; one in ten workers receive help. Nation wide 15% of those living in rural areas receive SNAP, a higher percentage than urban areas. Pope Francis teaches regarding the parable of the Good Samaritan. 
ON THE LIGHTER SIDE:
