Eucharistic Revival and Stewardship continued:

The first thing we do after the entrance procession is to sign ourselves in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. The cross is our sign of contradiction. It tells us of God's Trinitarian love by reminding us that Jesus' love led Him to suffer and die for us. We should never make the sign of the cross without realizing our need to thank God for sending Jesus to be our Savior!

Next we pause to call to mind our sins. We are sinners; we need God's mercy. Every time we gather to celebrate Mass, God offers us forgiveness. We are invited to thank God for His prodigal forgiveness.

The forgiveness of our sins leads us to say "Glory to God!" As we sing the Gloria we pray, "we give thanks for Your great glory." This is the first, but certainly not the last time we will say or hear the word "thanks" in the celebration of Mass.

Now we sit so the readings from scripture can both challenge and comfort us for the journey of faith. After the first reading, what do we say? "Thanks be to God! After the second reading, what do we say? "Thanks be to God!" Now we stand for the Gospel and what do we say when it is finished? "Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!" Praise is but another way to say "Thank You."

After the homily, we proclaim our belief in God as the creator of all things seen and unseen in our Profession of Faith. We are expressing our belief that everything we have is a gift from God. Our response is to live as caretakers of God's gifts and to use them wisely for the good of all. Another word for caretaker is "steward." We believe that we are called to live as stewards of God's creation. Stewardship is a way of life that enhances our relationship with God and a steward's heart to say "Thanks be to God!

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

November traditionally is the month when we remember our faithful departed. Our Church has long set aside this period of time to join with those who morn and to rejoice in the deep faith that calls us to see beyond time and space and realize the existence of life after death. For all in the northeastern part of our country, it is a time of year of dying—it is dark in the morning and dark approaches late in the afternoon. It is a time of year when trees lose their leaves, summer flowers are gone, and, other than the winter snow, the earth seems to be at rest. There is almost a natural call to reflect on dying and rising.

Occasionally when in the presence of a person who is about to pass, I will hear the person verbalize about a person they look forward to seeing or an adventure they believe they are beginning. Sometimes they have had visions of what is ahead and they anxiously look to embrace it. At times, there is a anomaly, the family weeping the anticipated death, and the dying person anticipating the future. Very often, we draw strength from those who are leaving us, or who have left us. Perhaps they will say or do something which helps us to move to the next step. As people of faith, we don't often think of how dynamic our faith is and how it does move us even when we believe we cannot be moved. November invites us to be part of the process and simply not a bystander.

When I listen to eulogies at funerals, rarely do I hear about business achievements, bank or investment accounts, buildings or politics. What I hear is about a person's character, relationships, lessons learned, examples given, and perhaps the most important, the virtue of love. The speaker will give witness to those intangible aspects of human life that somehow the deceased made tangible and real. The eulogy speaks of the interweaving of human life and the very real fact that most of those qualities extend beyond death. While these may be reflections of the past, they speak of living today and the promise of experiencing life again in the presence of God. Such eulogies remind us of life after death and that mourning is really about healing.

As we journey through these November days, the Church invites us to remember because we are people of memory. There is always a certain sadness when we experience death, as well as an occasional wish to have our loved ones come back to us. However, we are reminded that God gives us real time in our world to live our life, and has given eternal time to those who have left us. We are a faith people believing in life after death and reuniting with loved ones and friends. All is not lost, everything can be gained.

The month of November ends with Thanksgiving. It is a holiday when we are invited not only to be grateful for what we have but also to anticipate what will be. As we gather at our homes and tables, we pray for one another, remember the past, but also dream for the future. And what comes immediately after Thanksgiving—the season of Advent. The sacred time of a new beginning, anticipated confirmation of hope and dreaming of the Second Coming. November is a dynamic month filled with all kinds of human emotions. It is a time to reach into our hearts and remember to be grateful, shed an occasional tear, laugh a lot, dream, and remember that we are children of an everlasting, merciful, and all loving God.

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THE WOUNDED HEALERS' BEREAVEMENT SUPPORT GROUP:

The Wounded Healers Bereavement Support Group Meeting will be offered on Tuesday, November 14, 2023 at 7:00 PM, in person, at St. Mary Our Mother School, 811 Westlake St., Horseheads, NY. After entering the school driveway and bearing left (the length of the school on your right), drive to the parking lot. Use the door of the school across from the playground. You may want to bring a picture or two of your loved one who died, or a memento of significance. Each one has a personal grief journey so we are open to listen and are careful not to dogmatize. We welcome those who are grieving the death of a loved one to this sharing; as you are each hoping to find encouragement, insight, and normalization from each other. ALL are welcome. We strive to provide a safe, confidential, and open place where our motto remains, "We see healing in the very act of helping."

NOVEMBER IS BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH:

On July 25, 1990, the National Black Catholic Caucus of the United States designated November as Black Catholic History Month to celebrate the long history and proud heritage of Black Catholics. Two commemorative dates of African saints fall within this month: Saint Augustine's birthday and St. Martin de Porres' Feast day.

During the month of November, which marks a time when we pray for all saints and souls in loving remembrance, we take time to recall in a special way the saints and souls of Africans who have roots in the early centuries of the Church. We recall the Ethiopian eunuch of Acts 8:27-39, who converted to Christianity even before the Apostle Paul. And in more modern times, we have six Black Catholics on the path to sainthood: Mother Mary Lang, Sister Thea Bowman, Venerable Henriette Delille, Venerable Pierre Toussaint, Venerable Augustus Tolton, and Julia Greeley.

This month-long celebration serves to raise awareness of the rich history and cultural heritage of Black Catholics who have played a significant role in the development of the Church and the fight for civil rights. In their pastoral letter against racism, *Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love*, our U.S. Catholic Bishops teach: "Our faith gives us a treasury of inspiring holy men and women who courageously worked toward racial reconciliation, showing us the way forward.



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
