

Those Who Seek the Truth

In my work as a freelance writer, I have a regular column in the archdiocesan paper writing profiles of ordinary people in the local church. Laity, religious, and clergy alike — I hound them all to give me an interview, and when I do, the answer is almost always this: "You don't want to talk to me. There's nothing special about me."

I always try to convince them that there is something remarkable about everyone who is searching for the truth. It is easy to think we are not made for holiness because we are ordinary people with ordinary habits, ordinary abilities, and ordinary sins. It is easy (and very convenient) to designate holiness as something belonging to Better People. People like the saints. People like the Disciples.

The Bible gives us next to no personal information about the disciples. There is no archdiocesan newspaper profile on Andrew and Simon that can give us insight into who they were before they became St. Andrew, Inaugural Disciple and Announcer of the Messiah, and St. Peter, First Pope and the Rock-Upon-Which-Christ-Built-His-Church.

Yet I find myself insatiably curious about it. What was their childhood like? What games did they play with each other as the sun set, before their mother called them into bed? What did they think of as they fell asleep at night? What secret jokes did they share to make each other laugh? What were they afraid of? What did they hope for? Who did they want to be?

Before they were towering figures of salvation history, Simon and Andrew were just two men searching for the truth. When they looked at Christ, there was something that made it click. Perhaps they themselves could not identify what it was, but their hearts whispered it nonetheless: *There it is. We finally found it.*

Isn't that the best we can all hope for?

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

If you have been following any Catholic or network news prior to and over the month of October this past year, you have likely read about the Synod of Bishops which took place in Rome, October 4-29, 2023. You may know that this Synod, unlike any of the previous sixteen ordinary Synods beginning in the second century, included not just our Holy Father, cardinals, archbishops, bishops, but also priests, religious sisters and brothers, professors, students and other laity, both women and men, specifically chosen by Pope Francis I. And they also are afforded voting rights at the Synod sessions. This is one of the most historic and important events in the Catholic Church since the conveying of the Second Vatican Council in 1962. You may also remember that in 2021-2022, all people, including diocesan and parish faithful, young and old alike, people who have drifted from their Catholic roots and others beyond ourselves--were asked for our input into shaping the agenda of the Synod on Synodality. Our parish participated with a number of groups submitting their critical thinking, concerns, topics to be addressed toward the agenda. October 2023 was the first session of this Synod with a second session to follow in October 2024.

But just what exactly is a Synod in the Roman Catholic Church? A "synod" is a journey of discernment rooted in the Holy Spirit. In the Synod on Synodality, the entire Church has been called to discern how the Holy Spirit is moving through and with the Body of Christ--inside and outside the Church--so that we may continue to fulfill the Church's mission to evangelize the world. In essence, *communion*--working together as a whole; *mis-sion*--centered on the example of Jesus' work in the world; *participation-*-each person bringing his/her gifts and offering them to the mission.

If you have not already done so, I invite you to read the synthesis report from the parishes in the Diocese of Rochester at www.dor.org. that was submitted toward the agenda of the Synod. With the first session of the Synod concluded there is a synthesis report that can be found at www.synod.va, titled XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, Synthesis Report--A Synodal **Church in Mission.** This synthesis notes that some of the proposals on the agenda were proposals to establish new ministries for the laity, increase lay involvement in decision making, create processes to evaluate bishops' performance in their ministry, change the way the Church discerns "controversial issues," and expand the footprint of the synodal assemblies going forward. The report also stated that "the exercise of co-responsibility is essential for synodality, and is necessary at all levels of the Church." By virtue of our baptism, every single person shares in this overall mission of the Church.
