

St. Mary Our Mother School is accepting student registrations for the 2024/2025 school year for grades pre-k3 through grade six. Openings will be filled on a first-come, first- served basis. Parents or guardians who are new to St. Mary Our Mother School will need: birth certificate, baptismal certificate, immunization records and a completed parish commitment form for members of the parish. The nonrefundable registration fee is \$200 per family. Both before and after school care are available. The Unfailing Goodness of God

I have always wondered why Jesus told the cleansed leper not to publicize how he had been healed by the Son of God. It's not that I can't understand why Jesus would want to keep the matter quiet — after all, he knew that as soon as people heard, he would be mobbed with requests for healings, and his movements restricted.

What gets me is the fact that Jesus simply must have realized the leper would not listen to him. Why give someone a command you know they will ignore? It's a complicated question, and when I reflect on it, I can't help but connect it to another equally complicated question: why does God, all-good and all-knowing, allow bad things to happen?

Yes, God is all-good and all-knowing. So when He gives us free will, He knows what we will do with it. However, He is also allpowerful. He can and will bring good from any situation, any tragedy, or even any instance where someone ignores Him.

Was it a sin for this leper to do other than what Jesus had said? That's a heavy question for a Sunday morning! But it's plain to see that, even though this man ignored Jesus' command, God still used his actions. How many were brought to Christ because of the news spread by this leper!

As someone trying to live out a stewardship way of life, what is God requesting of you right now?

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

Wednesday of this week is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the season of Lent. This season is a sacred time for all Christians, leading to the celebration of Easter. For those preparing to celebrate the sacraments of Christian initiation at Easter, as well as those preparing to be received into full communion in the Church, it is a time of prayer and preparation for those sacraments. For those who regularly participate in the life of the Church, the sea-son of Lent offers us an opportunity to embrace the Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, so that we can recommit ourselves to living fully our baptismal promises which we will renew on Easter Sunday. For those who have been away from the Church for any other reason, Lent is a time to reconsider renewing that relationship once again. If you know of someone in this latter category, please offer a word of encouragement, invitation, and welcome to our parish. A great deal has been written about the "New Evangelization" that is needed in today's church. Evangelization begins with a word of encouragement and welcome. Wherever you find yourself in your faith journey, please use Lent 2024 as a time of spiritual growth and renewal.

Today's bulletin provides information on Lenten opportunities available to you at St. Mary Our Mother, as well as a Lenten calendar for your home. There also will be a Lenten Adult Education Series at St. Mary, Elmira on March 4-6th, with Father Robert Kennedy,

For the past years, we have offered publications for your use during the Lenten season. Two of these you are familiar with. The first is **"The Word Among Us,"** which offers a complete liturgical guide for the Lenten season, including scripture readings, Mass texts, and meditations. The second publication is **"The Little Black Book for Lent,"** which offers unique meditations for each day of Lent, There is a children's version of this book entitled **"The Little Purple Book for Lent,"** which will be distributed to our children in both our school and faith formation programs. These books will be available on the table in the vestibule.

A traditional devotion in the Church during the Lenten season is the public praying of the **Stations of the Cross.** We will publicly pray this devotion each Friday at 5:15 p.m. in the chapel. I invite you and your family to join us for this Lenten devotion. We also have a long standing practice of the sixth grade students from St. Mary Our Mother School offering a rendition of the "Living Stations of the Cross." This will be offered on Friday, March 22nd at 1:30 and 5:15 p.m.

As we begin this Lenten season, let us remember that we are called to reach out in love to our neighbor. Lent, as a season where we incorporate the disciplines of fasting, prayer and almsgiving, is also a time to reflect on how we can change and work towards loving others more readily. The ashes we receive this Wednesday are an outward sign of our commitment of showing our love for others in all we say and do.
