

PASTER'S PERSPECTIVE:

One of the disciplines we are called to embrace during the season of Lent is that of almsgiving. It is a word that can bring to mind people who might approach you asking for an occasional handout. In our part of the world, these occasions can be rare, after all, we have social service agencies which deal with these matters. So what significance does "almsgiving" hold for us, especially during the Lenten season?

The daily scripture readings in Lent make it clear that we are talking about the works of mercy and justice. References that are found in Isaiah 58: 1 - 9; Leviticus 19: 1 - 2, 11 - 18; and Mathew 25: 31 - 46. Almsgiving is not just about contributing your loose change to the poor. It is the sharing of our financial and material gifts with others, "paying it forward," as you might say, our blessings and recognizing that everything we think we have and own really belong to God. One bishop in the early Church would remind his people that almsgiving is the responsibility of everyone, no matter how great or small our resources might be. We can be equal in generosity of the heart for the benefit of our sisters and brothers in need.

As a parish, St. Mary Our Mother is blessed with financial, volunteer, and spiritual resources. A decision was made years ago to "tithe" our Sunday collections, setting aside a certain amount each week, and to designate those monies for some charitable cause or service. We actually don't take a tenth (a true tithe), but we set aside five percent for charitable causes. For example, four times a year we make a donation in the name of our parish to the Food Bank of the Southern Tier to support the Back Pack program, which helps provide nutritious food for at-risk children on weekends. These monies also help support our Social Ministry Committee's Christmas Sharing efforts each year. In addition, each week our parishioners are extremely generous in bringing food to help support the various food pantries in our area. A few years ago, the Food Bank of the Southern Tier recognized our parish as one of the top ten contributors to the Food Bank. So your contributions to St. Mary Our Mother include not only the support of the ministries of our parish and school, they also reach beyond to help unknown numbers of people who are in need.

In addition, each Lent we offer the Catholic Relief Services Rice Bowls during this season, asking you to participate in helping to feed hungry people throughout the world. For a second consecutive year, we were honored to have Deacon Kevin Carges, who is a Global Fellow for Catholic Relief Services, with us as our guest homilist, sharing with us his insight on the wonderful work being achieved throughout the world by Catholic Relief services. Many families put money in their rice bowls at meal time as they say grace and pray for the poor of the world. Others put money in their bowls when they find themselves using inappropriate language, or when they are gossiping or saying unkind words about another. These rice bowls are returned to the parish on Easter.

GOSPEL MEDITATION: 3rd Sunday of Lent


I am the Lord your God ... You shall not have other gods beside me. —Ex 20:2-3

One of the greatest golfers of all time - if not the greatest - was Jack Nicklaus. Which is why it is baffling that at the beginning of each season he would return to his childhood coach and re-learn how to grip the golf club. It's like Shakespeare re-learning the alphabet and grammar. Why would he do that? Because Jack knew that the fundamentals are always relevant. Perfecting and obsessing over his grip allowed him to do everything else in the game well. In sports and life, the best ones love the basics.

Similarly, as we begin Lent, we re-learn the spiritual basics in the Ten Commandments. Consider the first, to "have no other gods besides me." This is our "grip." Is our connection to God one of absolute fidelity and exclusive worship? Am I willing to let go of my precious idols, the things I cling to instead of God? Once we say "yes" to this fundamental question of our spiritual "grip," then we are ready to properly engage with everything else in life. Watch how beautifully the game of life unfolds in the next nine commandments (numbered in parentheses): how we speak to God and others (2 and 8), how we organize our week (3), how we relate to our family (4) and the wider community (5 and 7), how we live our sexuality (6), and how we order all the other desires of the human heart (9 and 10). But don't rush to these later commandments too soon! Everything in life is built on the first Commandment. The more we focus on worshiping God alone, the better we navigate the complexity of life with panache, effectiveness, and love.

Lenten challenge: This week, identify what you can do to better worship God alone. If you're not sure, scan the last nine commandments to identify what you are most likely to worship instead of God. Power, pleasure, control of your time, possessions, family, health, reputation, money? Commit to concrete action to help you let go of this "idol" to better hold on to God alone in faithful worship. Remember: the best love the basics.
