

A STEWARDSHIP MOMENT: The Good Shepherd and the Wolf

I remember very clearly the first movie I watched during my pregnancy with my eldest child. In this film, there is a scene where a young boy is kidnapped and shoved into the back of a van guarded by vicious dogs. His mother persists in trying to free him, even as the dogs snap at her. Their bared teeth and full-throated snarls don't slow her efforts in the slightest.

It wasn't a great movie or even a particularly great scene, but I'll never forget this scene. I'll never forget those dogs.

I had just learned that I was going to be a mother a few days ago. The life growing deep within seemed to me as frail as a whispered secret, but I loved it powerfully. I worried constantly if the baby was safe and healthy. I agonized over signs - real or imagined - that could tell me if the poppyseed-sized child was thriving or failing.

I understood, for the first time in my life, why a woman would charge a pack of attack dogs without hesitation—not because she should, but because she has to.

She could choose not to fight, certainly. She could walk away. But why would she? A future without her son is so much more painful than any physical wound. She may fear for her life, but she fears a life without her child so much more.

The Good Shepherd discourse reveals to us the motivation behind God's actions throughout all of salvation history. From Adam to Noah to Abraham, all the way down to the time of the Messiah and beyond, He keeps trying to get us back. He keeps braving the attack dogs, time after time. He never stops. He never grows weary. And it baffles us: what's in it for Him? we wonder, because we are quicker to give up on ourselves than He is. Why does He keep trying? He could choose not to fight, sure. But why would He? He doesn't want a future without us.

PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

This weekend we observe the World Day of Prayer for Vocations. As Catholics, we believe that through our Baptism God has a plan for our lives. God calls some to marriage, some to the ordained ministry as priests and deacons, and others to consecrated religious life and sisters or brothers, and others to live as generous single people. Fully living our own vocation - and teaching young people how to discern God's call - is a serious duty and responsibility, but also a joyful one.

The word "vocation" means "call". As Catholics, we believe God calls individuals to fulfill certain roles in the Church, both for their own holiness, and the good of the entire Church as the People of God. After the decision to follow Christ and seriously pursue holiness, our vocation is the most important decision in life.

Marriage: Most people are called to marriage - to wholeheartedly love their spouses and to joyfully welcome children. The purpose of marriage is for each spouse to bring out the best in their partners, help each other to one day reach heaven, and to teach their children to do the same. Like any vocation, marriage must be discerned, not assumed.

Consecrated Religious Life: Both women and men can join religious communities such as the Franciscans, Dominicans, Benedictines, the Sisters and Brothers of Mercy, the Sisters of St. Joseph, the school Sisters of Notre Dame, etc. The life, ministry, and work of religious orders varies greatly - some are primarily devoted to prayer; others work actively in schools, hospitals, orphanages, social services, pastoral ministry, prison and jail ministry, etc. Common to all religious communities are the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. The Sisters of Charity, founded by St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta adds one more vow; that of service to the poor.

Priesthood and/Diaconate: Priests being Jesus to people and people to Jesus through preaching and the sacraments. Priests are active as they counsel people, teach classes, celebrate the liturgy and sacraments, prepare homilies, administer parishes and much more. *Some surveys show that priests are the happiest people in the world!* Deacons also share in the sacrament of Holy Orders.

Dedicated Single Life: Some people serve God as single people, without marrying or making special promises or vows. Single people "contribute greatly to the good of the human family." (CCC2231). There are many single people who serve the Church with incredible generosity.

During this week and beyond, let us take seriously our responsibility to encourage the young people in our lives to understand the various vocations open to them. Let us also encourage our young members to consider that they might have a vocation to the priesthood or vowed religious life. May we and our young be open to the vocation to which God may be calling them, as we all seek holiness and to build up the Kingdom of God in our world through our particular vocation in life. WE CARE FOR GOD'S CREATION: Part 2:

If you have recently walked down city streets, driven on rural roads, or even walked along a beach on a remote island, you might notice something in common: plastics. Plastics are some of the most commonly littered items in the world and they are drowning our planet. The invention of plastic in 1907 was considered a breakthrough. Plastic products soon become omnipresent in our family lives. For many years, we only perceived the benefits of plastic and knew little of the damaging consequences for human health, natural ecosystems and the climate. Plastics are a problem mostly due to their unbiodegradable nature, the materials used for plastic production (from the refining of oil), and the challenges behind properly discarding them. The main cause for the increase in production of plastics is its use in packaging. 79% of discarded plastic ends up in landfills or in the natural environment (roadsides, oceans, etc.). Only 9% of discarded plastic is recycled. "I would like us all to make a serious commitment to respect and protect creation, to be attentive to every person, to counter the culture of waste and disposables, to promote a culture of solidarity and of encounter." (Pope Francis - General Audience June 2013). How might we begin to address the challenge of a culture of plastic waste at home and in our parish activities?
